Doing Nothing

In February Australia passed a "right to disconnect" law that prohibits employers from contacting workers after hours, with penalties including possible jail time for bosses who do not cooperate. The law goes into effect later this year.

Certain jobs of course are exempt, but under the law, employees will be able to make complaints with their employer about after-hours phone calls or the expectation that they answer emails outside of their working hours.

I applaud this! Everyone deserves a right to disconnect; to switch off from the pressures and demands of work and life.

We're entering what is for some a holiday period, an opportunity to escape to the sun or to whatever climate, culture or adventure floats your boat. You might know that the word 'holiday' derives from the old English word Haligdaeg which means 'holy day'. One translation of 'holy' is 'set apart'. So, these are days set apart to step off the treadmill of life and make time for relaxation and self-care.

Sometimes doing 'nothing' is the best thing we can do. The perfectionist and workaholic within us of course does its darndest to make us feel guilty when we stop. Doing 'nothing' however is always doing something. It's a resting, a refreshing, it's a re-fueling. In many religious traditions there's an invitation to retreat. These are times set aside to retreat from our usual rhythms to invest in reconnecting with God.

Holy-days are essential, whether we spend them on beaches, in back gardens or with a religious community. So, take time this summer to switch off. Be kind to yourself. Have permission to do absolutely 'nothing', because we all have the 'right to disconnect'.

Eco Church: Caring for God's Earth

What have we been doing?

Having conversations

The article on Eco Church in the newsletter has generated quite a bit of interest and a lot of informal conversations. It turns out that quite a number of us would like to be involved at some level. So it is planned to convene a more formal meeting soon. We are also tapping into the experience of those at St Andrew's who are further along in their journey towards the Bronze Award.

Thinking about energy saving

It seems that quite a number of us are interested in energy saving. We have been talking about the possibility of installing new generation infra red panels. Next steps include a conversation with St Andrew's church, who are thinking along similar lines and a visit to Hertford Castle at September's Eco Fest, where it will be possible to look at examples in situ, as well as Air Source Heat Pumps and other innovations. An energy audit of the church is also planned.

Awayday pledges

Some of us at St Mary's took part in the session on *Evaluating the Natural World* at the April Away Day in St Joseph's in the Park and made pledges to support our natural environment. Others celebrated the natural world in art, using natural found objects to create a piece of artwork.

Nature in the churchyard

As we said earlier, we have been looking at the range of wild nature in the churchyard and created a page on the website to post pictures of what we have seen for everyone to appreciate. Our churchyard at St Mary's is a very special space and is there for everyone to enjoy in their own personal way. Next steps will be to look at ways in which we can foster and encourage even more species in this lovely space. Here is what we are enjoying at the moment



English Yew (taxus baccata)

St Mary's has many yew trees, the quintessential tree of the English churchyard. Their link with sacred sites pre-dates Christianity. They are considered to symbolise everlasting life and rebirth because of their longevity and ability to regenerate.



Purple deadnettle (*lamium* purpureum)

This pretty dead nettle does not sting and was traditionally used for medicine. As it flowers all year long, it is an important food source for wild bees which are active in Autumn, Winter and early Spring.



Horse chestnut tree (aesculus hippocastanum)

Look out for conkers in the Autumn! This tree's pinky white flowers provide nectar and pollen for bees in the Spring and its leaves are food for the caterpillars of the Triangle Moth.



Bluebell (*hyacintha non-scripta*)

If you're lucky, you may spot a few bluebells in the churchyard! Bluebells are visited by a range of insects, but mainly pollinated by bumble bees.



Annual Parochial Church Meeting

The APCM took place on Sunday 28th April in church after the 9.15 service. There was an excellent turnout and below are the main extracts from Rev Alan's team vicar report

"As beautiful, and cared for and historic as this building is, this building of course is not the Church. And as familiar and comforting and inspiring perhaps as the liturgy, tradition and music might be, this also is not the Church. Take them away, and we still have the Church. Why? Because we are the Church; you and I, members of a community of ordinary, beautiful and yes broken people with the purpose of living out our call to be Christ's presence where we are.

The American theologian John Howard Yoder unpacks something of that call: 'The church seeks to help form people who can risk being peaceful in a violent world, risk being kind in a competitive world, risk being faithful in an age of cynicism, risk being gentle among those who admire the tough, risk love when it may not be returned, because we have the confidence that in Christ, we have been reborn into a new reality.'

Peaceful, kind, faithful, gentle, loving. This is our purpose and our calling. And we all know that however hard we try; at times we fall short. As the saying goes; 'If you find a perfect church, don't join it'. Because if you do, it will no longer be a perfect church.

So here we are, perfectly imperfect. And we gather today to reflect on this past year together, to give thanks for all that Christ has achieved in us and through us, and to explore a little where He may be calling us next.

Fresh in the memory of many of us will be our recent joint Parish Away Day with our sister church St Andrew's. Our theme this year was 'Wholehearted' living, defined by Brene Brown as 'Engaging with our lives from a place of worthiness... cultivating the courage, compassion and connection to wake up in the morning and think, 'No matter what gets done and how much is left undone, I am enough.'

"So here we are perfectly imperfect"

It was so special to have so many of us, of so many different ages gather to worship, explore and connect. Our thanks in particular go to St Joseph's in the Park school who offered such wonderful hospitality not to mention delicious food. If you haven't tried an Away Day, you really are missing something very special.

Our work within the three schools including St Joseph's, Hertingfordbury Cowper and Hertford St Andrew's, continues with whole-school weekly collective worship (or assemblies) on Tuesdays and Early Years on Wednesday morning (one of the absolute highlights of my week). I'm indebted yet again to Tracy Plumpton who continues to work alongside me.



It's always a joy to welcome our schools into the church building for their special services. It was also great to represent our church at the school's Christmas Tree festival.

Our congratulations go to Hertingfordbury Cowper who this year were awarded the highest accolade by the Church school's inspectors, SIAMS.

Last year we trialed Forest Church in the Forest School area at St Jo's. We weren't entirely sure it was right format and location, so we took the decision to suspend that for the time being as we pray about other expressions of outdoor church, the first of which was A Soulful Walk on Palm Sunday in Panshanger. So, watch this space.

Last year we held a joint parish Bible Course here in the Brace Room which was hugely appreciated by those who came. We hope to hold that again beginning Thursday 6th June and to offer a follow-up course on Romans in October. There are two Exploring Confirmation sessions in May here in the Brace Room and we look forward to hosting a Confirmation service at St Andrew's on Tuesday 4th June with the former Bishop of the Falkland Islands no less!

You'll have noticed no doubt the new housing development Blakemore Manor on Sele is nearing completion. This year Kath Oates and Stephane McCarthy have been welcoming the new residents with a card and a gift of some biscuits, and have been having some wonderful conversations. Many of those who live there look towards St Mary's even though officially they live in St Andrew's parish. One of the things that came up a lot was how fortunate we are to have Panshanger Park on our doorstep, so we're beginning to explore how we might create opportunities for people there to connect with one another and with something greater in that particular Great Outdoors. It was wonderful to have our first New Year's Walk there ending with a welcome beverage at the Golden Griffin.

Our fortnightly Mindfulness sessions at the Hub on Sele seem to be going from strength to strength with a really lovely and supportive community growing there. Our weekly Wednesday evening Mindfulness and Meditation continues to be popular. I love leading these sessions but it's a big time commitment, so starting in June, it will run fortnightly with every other session being hybrid both in church and online. That said, I'm afraid I'm on holiday in June so there will just be one session on Wednesday 5th.

We're hugely grateful to the Friends of St Mary's who have hosted lots of wonderful opportunities to connect and fundraise for the church. Among these have been several concerts, the ever-popular Race Night, the Christmas Market, the Summer Fun Day and the Parish Breakfast to name but a few. We're looking forward to Café Français (mais oui) on the 28th September.



We continue to hold Evening Prayer here monthly and a weekly compline online. Many of us and our four legged friends enjoyed a chaotic but wonderful pet service in September and look forward to this years canine chorus on 22nd September. This year, across both churches, we've introduced a few new seasonal services; A Mindful Christmas proved very popular as did Beer and Carols in the churchyard which was for many people the highlight of their Christmas.

We continue to be very grateful to the Zoom team who enable folk from far and wide to connect with others and with God.

My huge thanks go to all the individuals and teams that sustain the ministry and mission of this church including the Choir, our choirmaster and organist Paul, our fantastic wardens and PCC, our grass cutters, flower arrangers, coffee teams, caterers, bellringers, pastoral visitors and locker-uppers who enable the church to stay open. And we know that many people appreciate this space to pray and reflect outside of services.

This year it's been wonderful to add several new people to the Ministry Team, Adrian Walter and Nick Hoyle as Lay Leaders of Worship and Maria Henrikson-Bell taking on the added hat of Pioneer Leader. Our particular thanks as always goes to Rev Bill Church who continues to exercise his wonderful ministry among us.

"How grateful I am to be your priest and how thankful for your support and care"

You will perhaps be aware that the Church of England has authorised new prayers of blessing for those in same-sex couples entitled Prayers of Love and Faith. In the pastoral guidance The C of E writes; The Prayers of Love and Faith make provision for stable, faithful relationships between same-sex couples and for giving thanks for their faithfulness and their fruitfulness in service to God and neighbour. In that sense, they recognize the couple's commitments to one another. They ask for God's grace in the holy ordering of companionship and godly love as they follow Christ and seek to grow in holiness. They ask for God's blessing for them and their families as they offer self-giving love to one another, and in their witness and service to their neighbours'.

These are currently only authorised within existing services but there may come a time when it will be possible to have a separate service of blessing. The pastoral guidelines state that it's up to the individual priest as to whether they are happy in conscience to offer these prayers. It will perhaps come as no surprise to you that I am fully supportive. It will be important however to consult with the PCC and with the wider congregation. If you have anything you'd like to contribute to that conversation, do please talk to me.

I'd like to end by saying how grateful I am to be your priest, and how thankful I am for your support and your care. Thank you to each one of you for all that are and all that you bring to the life and worship of this perfectly imperfect church we call St Mary's." – Alan

Top marks for the Parish Awayday

Forbes Mutch reflects on a wholehearted day at St Joseph's in the Park School, Hertingfordbury. As if by divine design, the damp clouds of the wettest spring on record cleared as the guests gathered cheerfully in the school car park. They registered their attendance (for fire safety reasons) and made their way into the school dining room for coffee and biscuits. After careful planning by St Andrew's and St Mary's, the 2024 joint parish 'awayday' or get-together got underway and our enthusiasm was wholehearted, which was just as well, because that was the theme of the day.

Alan Stewart explained that the day was about wholehearted living, as defined by the American Christian philosopher Dr Brene Brown who once said that 'wholehearted living is about engaging with our lives from a place of worthiness. It means cultivating the courage, compassion and connection to wake up in the morning and think: *No matter what gets done and how much is left undone, I am enough.*'

After an all-age introduction with worship, the children and young people left for their own activities, led by John Wacher. The rest of us considered in a relaxed atmosphere what wholeheartedness meant in our daily lives. Some interesting thoughts and opinions emerged, confirming that we are a diverse and eclectic bunch, and also how the annual awayday always creates a safe place for personal expression.

After a coffee break, we split into groups and joined our selected workshops, which provided something for everyone. As one parishioner said at the start: 'I couldn't decide; I felt spoilt for choice'. I know what she meant, as the range of sessions included standing, lying and sitting in Judy Bunny's Pilates class; wholeheartedly discovering joy through singing with Sam Chaplin; enjoying the good weather outside with Nick Hoyle, producing artwork using natural materials – stones, twigs, foliage, blossom – or enjoying an interactive discussion led by Jenny Mutch about how communities around the world are engaging wholeheartedly with nature and how individuals and local churches can make a difference in the fight to protect God's creation.





WALTER WALLINGER CHARITY

Walter Wallinger died in 1709 leaving "Four hundred pounds for the placing of poor children of this Parish as Apprentices."

Times have moved on and the trustees of the charity now take the view that the income from the endowment should be used to give grants for educational purposes to people under 25 who have for at least two years lived, or been educated, within the ancient parish of Hertingfordbury which today roughly means Hertingfordbury village and the five Greens and outlying houses.

Something of the order of £1500 is available annually. Typically grants are one-off payments not exceeding £450 for something that will help with the applicant's education in a broad sense, such as a musical instrument, specialist equipment, a field or other course. Grants are available to anyone in school, FE or Higher Education.


