## iVisionary

In 2011, the premature death of Steve Jobs, cofounder and chairman of Apple, prompted an overwhelming international outpouring of grief. Tributes to the creative genius behind the iconic iPhone and iPad, included former US President Barack Obama who said 'He changed the way each one of us sees the world'. One of the most poignant and moving tributes came from the singer Neil Diamond who Twittered just one word; 'iSad'.

For many, Steve Jobs will be remembered for an inspirational speech he gave to students graduating from Stanford University in 2005. In that speech he spoke candidly about living with cancer.

"When I was 17", he said, "I read a quote that went something like, *'if you live each day as if it was your last, some day you'll most certainly be right'.* It made an impression on me and since then for the last 33 years, I have looked in the mirror every morning and asked myself, 'If today were the last day of my life, would I want to do what I am about to do today?'. And whenever the answer has been 'no' for too many days in a row, I know I need to change something."

"Remembering that I will be dead soon", he continued, "is the most important tool I've ever encountered to help me make the big choices in life. Because almost everything all external expectations, all pride, all fear of embarrassment or failure - these things just fall away in the face of death, leaving only what is truly important. No-one wants to die; even people who want to go to heaven don't want to die to get there. And yet death is the destination we all share. No-one has ever escaped it. And that is as it should be, because death is very likely the single best invention of life. It is life's change agent." These extraordinary words are so counter-cultural. We avoid all talk of death. And yet death is part of life, and a healthy respect for death can invest life with meaning and significance. An embracing of death led



Steve Jobs to inspire a generation and change a world.

November is a season of remembering. We will wear poppies to remember the Fallen. At services on All Souls and All Saints we will light candles in memory of those who have recently died and read the names of the departed whose lives are part of our church's story. Perhaps during this season of remembering we should each dare to stare death in the mirror and ask ourselves 'if today was my last day.... what would I do differently?'

How we respond to that simple question could change our lives, and just possibly could change the world.



Please be aware of road closures in the town for Remembrance Day ceremonies. The **8am** Book of Common Prayer service will be marking Remembrance with a two-minute silence.

## Bereavement Service: Sunday 17th November at 2pm

Each year we gather for a special service when we remember by name those who have died in the previous two years. It's a short service with some music and readings and an opportunity to light a candle in memory of loved ones. This has been, for many people, a very helpful and moving part of their grieving process.

**How to include the name of a loved one:** those who have received an invitation from us can be assured that the name of their loved one is recorded for remembrance at the service. If St Andrew's/St Mary's clergy did not conduct the service of someone you would like to be remembered, there is an online form on the church website. You will find it on the Bereavement Service page under the Services and Occasions tab.

## CHURCH MATTERS AUDIO-VISUAL UPGRADE

We are pleased to report that the Project 25K appeal has been successful in raising approximately £17,000. Money is still coming in.


We would like to extend a BIG thank you to everyone who has supported this appeal. Your generosity through prayer as well as in giving time and/or money has been wonderful. It has made a HUGE difference to our ability to complete the work.

While we expect to be approximately  $\pounds$ 7,000 short of our proposed target, we have asked the contractor to install the big screen and, at least, two small screens (for the choir) at the same time as they will be installing the sound system. This will be done during the period 4th-13th November.

To fully fund the complete installation, we will need the extra  $\pounds$ 7,000 but going ahead now will mean we do not incur extra expense from the contractors coming back to the church for a second time.

We continue to invite further donations and are confident that predicted further income for the rest of this year (e.g. from events and Christmas activities) can ensure the funds are secured without any significant impact on our church budget or cash reserves. So far, the only use of church funds has been when we have generated a surplus at the end of the last two years.

The final stage of the work (i.e. installing screens in the rest of the church) can be completed in due course as funds become available. The cabling will have been installed so it should be a straightforward task. In the meantime, we believe this is a great opportunity to fulfil a project that has been part of the PCC's planning since 2021.

## BARBARA HURFORD: A LONG AND ACTIVE LIFE

Barbara was a much-loved and respected member of St Andrew's for very many years and throughout her long life, Barbara remained strong in her faith, loyal to her family and friends and an inspiration to others.

Born in 1931, Barbara had a tough childhood. An only child, her mother died when she was just 14 and her father kicked her out of the family home when she was just 16, saying she was old enough to fend for herself and maybe she could live in the church because she spent so much time there! Her teenage years were influenced by her grandmother, a strict Victorian woman, who herself died in her late 90s. Sadly,

very little is known about her childhood experiences. She formed, however, a very close relationship with her cousin, Barrie, and the pair of them remained close until the end.

Barbara met her husband at the church youth group and they married at Edgware Parish Church on the 21<sup>st</sup> February 1953. Her first-born son, Stephen, arrived in the world in January 1955. In 1956 her father turned up at their home a penniless bankrupt and Barbara took him in and he lived with the family until his death, the day their second son, Graham, was born on the 29<sup>th</sup> January 1957.

Stephen and Graham were brought up to be independent and self-sufficient and their drive stems from Barbara's encouragement, support and enthusiasm, but most importantly her love.

Barbara was an enthusiastic sports woman. She played many sports, which, in no particular order, included bowls, badminton, tennis, skiing, golf and croquet. She held a narrow boat captain's licence, earned sailing qualifications and had ballroom dancing lessons.

As a member of U3A she was often responsible for organising walking trips, all of which had been walked and checked out thoroughly.

Barbara's leadership qualities straddled several organisations including the Women's Institute, where she was an active member throughout her adult life. Her friends at Waterford remember her fondly, where she was for a period their president.

Barbara's Girlguiding career extended for over 60 years, for which she was received many awards, including her 60-year service award and most significantly the Laurel Award, the second highest honour in Guiding, which can only be awarded by Headquarters, along with the Trefoil Brooch, awarded for dedication and service to the Trefoil Guild, which is the supporting organisation for the Girl Guides. Many hundreds of women have been directly helped by her inspirational leadership. A recognition of her dedication and her service to others is the honour of having the County Standard being formally displayed at her memorial service at St Andrew's Church as a tangible public statement of gratitude by Girlguiding for her lifelong dedication to the organisation.

Finally, a word from Barbara's granddaughter, Gillian, "She has been an incredible, positive influence on all of our lives for which we have immeasurable gratitude. We are immensely proud of all her achievements and the impact Gran has had on us as a family, as well as so many within the community."



"Natasha and I met six years ago and having been engaged for 18 months, it took us nine visits to different venues to



## LATIN LINK & ANGEL TREE CENTRE

#### Jenny Aitken brings us an update from Julie Noble in Oruro, Bolivia on life in the country and her work at the Angel Tree Centre.

Julie Noble is part of the Latin Link American mission. Latin Link is charity registered in England and an international community with a calling to love and serve God and our neighbour. Most members of Latin Link work in Latin American countries while some work with Latin Americans in other parts of the world. Angel Tree Centre works with prisoners' children and families.

Julie Noble writes 'Bolivia's problems continue. July and August brought blockades and strikes over the lack of fuel. In September ex-President Evo and his supporters called on President Arce to step down because of economic problems. There followed serious confrontations between the two groups of followers. However, the economic situation here is deteriorating. Besides the fuel shortages, gas exports are declining and food costs are rising. The Presidential election is next year!

The Angel Tree Centre winter holidays were extended from two to four weeks because of the cold. This gave me time to progress my online course in Supervision of Restorative Justice Cases with the Welsh Probation Service. This has helped me with looking at how to systemise the Restorative Justice work and be more intentional in case supervision. Numbers at the Centre are down owing to the children having difficulty in travelling but on the plus side we have seven final year students from the German School who work with the children on Friday afternoons. Together they make and sell cakes to raise funds for the Centre.



The second semester at Renacer Young Offender Centre where I also work, began in August. Today there were over ninety young people detained in the Centre many of them are jucos (mineral stealers). We have been assigned new individual cases for this semester. I have four drug cases as well as the rape case from last semester.

During July and August, a colleague and I worked on thirty-three restorative involved justice interventions. This organising sessions with young offenders, visiting courts in the city and provinces to look for the victim information, contacting and visiting victims, setting up family meetings and planning restorative conferences. Thankfully the number of cases reduced a bit in September and we now have just nineteen active cases.'

At the end of Julie's letter Julie makes the following request, 'I am planning to take a sabbatical during May and June 2025 in the UK. If anyone knows somewhere independent where I could stay during part or all of that time please get in touch.' Please contact Jenny Aitken if you can help Julie.

## **REFLECTIONS ON A BIBLE PASSAGE**

Reflections on Mark 9 v 47: And if your eye causes you to stumble, pluck it out. It is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than to have two eyes and be thrown into hell.

Over the centuries the Church has allowed some very unfortunate misconceptions about Hell to get hold of our imaginations. The art of painters like Hieronymus Bosch and Peter van Breughel have given us a vision of Hell as a flaming subterranean torture chamber where Satan torments the wicked for eternity.

Regrettably, in English we use the one word, Hell, to translate three different words in the Bible. In the Old Testament, Hebrew 'Sheol' and its Greek equivalent 'Hades' are simply the place where the dead go. Whilst it is presented as a rather cheerless place, it has no real associations with reward and punishment. It certainly isn't the spiritual dystopia of mediaeval imagination. In fact, the Old Testament really doesn't concern itself very much with what happens when we die.

When Jesus talks about hell in Mark's Gospel, the word he uses in his own language is Gehenna. You can all go to Gehenna if you like. Literally. It's on Google Maps. It's a deep valley or ravine just outside the old walls of Jerusalem, the Valley of Hinnom in modern Hebrew. It's rather pretty suburban parkland now, overlooked by the old city walls around the Gate of Joppa. But in Jesus time, and for centuries before, Gehenna was the city rubbish dump, the municipal landfill site. Gehenna is outside the city wall. You don't want your smelly, rotting rubbish inside the city, do you? You throw it over the wall. Like most places where organic waste is piled up in large quantities, the tip would constantly catch fire and burn in a slow, smouldering, smoky way. Was that the inspiration for the everlasting flames of hell?

When we know all this, Jesus' rather gruesome image about cutting off a foot or tearing out an eye and throwing it away, can suddenly make a lot more sense. Throw your eyeball on the rubbish tip, it's better than all of you landing on the rubbish tip. I think Jesus might even have got a laugh for this line!

So this passage isn't about sending people to Hell. It's about the Kingdom of God, the place that Jesus wants to lead us to. The place that is so amazingly good that it is worth almost any sacrifice, any radical act to get onto the right side of the wall, the right side of the frontier. Would you give your right arm – or your right eye – to get there?

We hear each week the stories of countless thousands of desperate people who make their way to the frontiers and coastlines of Europe and the USA each week? People who make unimaginable sacrifices for their hopes of a life of greater security or prosperity.

How much would we sacrifice to secure our citizenship in the Kingdom of God? It's not a Kingdom with clear geographical boundaries. There are no walls or fences defining its borders – though sadly there are some Christians

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who seem to think there ought to be. It's any place and any time where God is acknowledged as King, where God's rule, God's wise and loving laws, are recognised and lived out. Who wouldn't want to go there?

Let us imagine ourselves as eager, impatient immigrants heading for the Kingdom of God. We've got our Visa -Jesus himself has sorted that out for us, so we don't need to worry about passport control; but there are still a few formalities to attend to at the frontier. There is no customs union between Gehenna and the Kingdom of God, and there are a few things you can't bring with you, things that have no place in the Kingdom of God. And if you want that better life, you're going to have to leave them behind. If you want to cross over, throw them in the rubbish bin over there. Not because of some arbitrary law of the divine immigration office, but because you can't live the life of a citizen of the Kingdom of God until you've got rid of them.

There is no compromise. You cannot just offer to pay more for excess baggage, you cannot offer to pay customs duty on it. You must leave it behind, throw it in the rubbish.

Greed. Prejudice. Pride. Lust. Dishonesty. Privilege. Indifference. Bitterness and Anger. Unrepented and unresolved conflicts. Unforgiven injuries.

There's no room in the Kingdom of God for any of these. And I know that giving such things up is seriously hard. For many of us, these burdens have taken deep root in our identities. They feel like part of who we are. Maybe it is not too great an exaggeration to speak of cutting off your hand or tearing out your eye.

What might you need to cut off and throw in the bin?

Whatever has no place in the Kingdom of God is rubbish. But it doesn't have to hold you back. It belongs on the tip outside the walls. Let it burn away there. You don't want it. This is not an image of punishment, it is an image of liberation.

I wonder what Jesus would say about rubbish today, 2,000 years on? I think he'd take a rather different, and perhaps more cheerful approach.

We're not supposed to throw things on the rubbish tip anymore, are we? Especially not organic waste - like hands and feet and eyes. Our local authorities try very hard to reduce the amount of stuff we throw into landfill sites. They fill our gardens with multicoloured bins and tell us to sort our rubbish out. Because so much of it can be recycled \_ refurbished, reprocessed, and used again in new and different ways.

Organic waste is turned to compost. Nutrients for new growth, for new life. Other waste streams go to power stations and bring heat and light to our homes. New power from old rubbish.

I think Jesus would have liked those ideas. Don't let your life end up on the rubbish tip. Recycle it. Let God make it new, transform it, make it ready to use again, in different and surprising ways. New life, new power. But above all, a creation fit and ready to live as a citizen of the Kingdom of God.
