#### I BELIEVE

When somebody says they don't believe in God, I sometimes ask them to describe the God they don't believe in. Nine times out of ten, I don't believe in that God either.

Everyone believes in something. Historically the Church has put its beliefs into words by composing creeds or statements of faith.

If you were to write your own creed beginning with the words 'I believe...', what would you write?

During this time of Advent as we prepare to celebrate perhaps the most un-believable of stories, I've found a creed that speak for me...

1 believe in God; the God of all creeds, with all their truths; but above all, in the God who rises from the dead words to become part of life.

I believe in a God who accompanies me along every step of my path on this earth; many times walking behind me, watching me and suffering with my mistakes; other times walking beside me, talking to me and teaching me; and other times walking ahead of me, guiding and marking my pace.

I believe in the God of flesh and blood, Jesus Christ; the God who lived in my skin, and tried on my shoes; the God who ate and starved, who had a home and suffered loneliness, who was praised and condemned, kissed and spat on, loved and hated; the God who went to parties and funerals; the God who laughed and cried.

I believe in the God who looks at the world and sees the hatred that segregates, hurts and kills; who sees the dirty rivers and the dead fish, the destruction of the earth and the

piercing of the sky; who sees the future mortgaged and man's debt growing.

I believe in the God who sees all this... and cries.



But I also believe in the God who sees a mother giving birth – a life born from pain; who sees two children playing – a seed growing; who sees a flower blooming out of the debris – a new beginning; who sees the sun rising every morning – a time of opportunity.



I believe in a God who sees all this ... and smiles, because in spite of it all, there is hope."

This Christmas, may we all know something of that hope.



#### On St Andrew's Secret Service

Most of you will have noticed in the monthly calendar (back page) that there is a service of Morning Prayer every Monday and Thursday at 8am. Way back in the 1970s in the days when the Rector was the Rev. Duncan Dormer the services of Morning and Evening Prayer were said in church every day. how it became just Morning Prayer on Monday and Thursday I cannot now remember but Ι would like recommend these services to you as an excellent way to start the week and the day.

On Monday the Common Worship Daily Prayer book is used. There is a different service set for every day of the week and so that the same order of service is not used every Monday a different day is used each week. This always leads to Bill asking when he arrives on Monday morning 'what day is it today?'!!

On Thursday the 1662 Book of Common Prayer is used. A lovely order written in God's own language.

Each service includes a psalm, canticles, a reading from the Old and New Testaments as well as a collect and prayers. Lasting no longer than 20 minutes it is a very peaceful service and much to be recommended as a special way to begin a difficult day, to remember a loved one or to pray for someone who needs our love and attention.

Usual there are only 2 or 3 gathered together but the chapel has seating for 12 and we could always move into the church if numbers grow!! Look forward to seeing you there.


#### From Packaging to Poppies



# HERTFORD CHILDREN'S CHOIR

Rachel Chaplin reports on the launch of a children's community choir at St Andrew's



Some of my earliest memories of experiencing sheer joy and fun are associated with singing. At school we used to sing in assembly every morning, sing in class music lessons and sing in the school choir. I wonder whether children today have fewer chances to sing. There certainly seems to be a lot less singing in schools and that's one reason why I am excited to start a children's community choir here at St Andrew's, to give children the chance to enjoy music and start a journey of singing which could stay with them for life. The choir will be open to anyone aged 8 to 13 who loves music. There's no audition and anyone can come along and try it out.

Singing in a choir is a fantastic way to learn music. Children joining the choir will learn the basics of reading music, develop confidence in their own voice and learn to sing in harmony with others. Each session will start with fun warm-up games, before we move onto learning music including folk songs, rounds, gospel songs and classical pieces.

The children's choir will rehearse here at St Andrew's Church, a wonderful venue with a long tradition of hosting live concerts, and the home church of St Andrew's Church choir which sings

weekly Sunday services. There are plans afoot for the children's choir to perform termly in an all-age service and also at community events such as a Saturday coffee morning. Further down the line we intend to collaborate with other choirs and musical ensembles to give the children the chance to perform in larger concerts alongside experienced musicians.

All in all, we hope the children's choir will be part of the church's welcome to the local community, opening its doors to people in and around Hertford with a love of music at the heart. The choir will be led by myself and my husband, Sam Chaplin. We are both professional musicians – I am an orchestral oboist, composer and teacher and Sam is a jazz trumpeter, singer and choir leader.

The children's choir will kick-off in January with two taster sessions on Friday January 10<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> at 5:30-6:45pm in St Andrew's Church. 





#### CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE AT ST ANDREW'S

# CHILDREN ARE WELCOME AND PLAY AN IMPORTANT PART IN THE LIFE OF ST ANDREW'S

At St Andrew's, we value greatly their contribution to worship and the life of the church community and believe we can learn much from their example. Here is a snapshot of activities for children.

### Junior Church

During the 10.30am Parish Communion on Sundays in term time, there are activities for children in the St Andrew's Centre run by our Children & Families Worker, Lindsey Betteridge and members of the church. Every Sunday, except during the All-Age Service, the children will begin the service with the congregation and then, after the first hymn, they leave to join Junior Church.



Looking back at a life filled with music, languages, faith and family

St Andrew's Church was filled to overflowing on 14th November to remember and give thanks for the life of Harold Chaplin, husband to Jane, father to Fiona and Sam, and grandfather to Becca, Hannah, and Zac, Emily, Clara and Grace. Harold died suddenly, aged 78, on 17<sup>th</sup> This was a October. memorial service filled with music including two anthems written by Harold

and sung superbly by Sam Evans and a choir of professional singers, while Barbara Hopkin and her jazz band brought back memories of jazz sessions Harold and Jane's garden performing "Time after Time". Andrew's Choir with which Harold sung for three decades led the hymns which reflected Harold's strong Christian faith with "All my hope on God is founded" and "I will sing the wonderous story". The service also included a story called "Le Chanson des Escargots" about two snails which Harold had translated. It was read in French by Harold's friend Patrick Boucher who had travelled from his home in France to be there. You will read more about this and other elements of the service below.

Harold's cousin, Rob Newsom, gave the first of two eulogies from which the following has been taken: "Harold was born on the 16<sup>th</sup> October 1946 in Derby. He was christened here at St Andrew's, Hertford, where his parents had been married the previous year. Two years later his sister Rosie was born in



Bradford. Harold's father Christopher had worked as a civil engineer for the London and North Eastern Railway, but he developed serious health problems when his children were still young, and was unable to carry on working. The family then moved to Watford where the family with Harold's grandfather, Harold Newsom.

When Harold was 7 years old, the Chaplin family moved to Heswall on the Wirral where my parents ran Moorland House, a preparatory school for boys, and Harold's mother Ruth took over the catering.

At 13 Harold went to Haileybury College. offered Haileybury plenty opportunities for music. Harold carried on through piano grades, he played the leading role of Pooh Bah in the Mikado, and played in his first band, a pop group called the Soustelles. He also took forward his interest in flight by choosing to join the Air Force section of the school cadet force. Harold did well academically particularly in modern languages. He rose to be a school prefect, head of Trevelyan House and finally head boy.

Harold went on to Glasgow University where he spent a year, but he didn't feel at home there and made a transfer to Edinburgh where he read French and History. This proved to be a fortuitous move, as there he meet Jane Melville.

Jane was selling tickets for a choral concert during the university Rag week. She approached Harold and offered him a ticket, to which he replied, "Well actually I'm singing in it". They went to a party after the concert, when Harold impressed her by sitting down at a piano and playing The Girl from Ipanema.

After they had each graduated, Jane and Harold were married at All Saints' Church here in Hertford."

Harold's son, Sam, gave the following eulogy to his father:

"Thank you for coming today to give thanks for his life and thank you for the amazing outpouring of love for him and support for us that you've shown in the last few weeks. I'm going to take you through the order of service as a springboard into his life.

The choir opened the service with the anthem, 'The Lord is my Strength and my Song'. It was written in 1980. I was 5, he was 34. It was the first choir piece he wrote - and what a piece! - a triumphant march of strength. Harold was always a musician, but I think he always wanted to be a professional musician. But back then the options were very narrow - you were either an orchestral performer, a rock star or a school music teacher and not much in between. None of which really suited his particular gift mix. So he studied languages, initially travelled the world with a job in sales, then in the early years of my life he taught French in a pretty tough greater London secondary school. But all the time the music kept flowing out - he wrote a musical for that school about taking year 7s (1st years) on a day trip to France it was called... Le Day Trip! It featured one of the greatest baddies ever created: Gaston Le Malguet Contrabandier stealing golden watches night and day! Bah bah! He sings a great tango! Harold's amazing ability was his musical ear. I remember for my primary school fête he had a stall which was called something like 'beat Harold' where you could request a song or a theme if he couldn't play tune and immediately you got your money back the PTA made some good money that year. So we come to this anthem - his first choral piece, written for his local church choir - St Andrew's Ham, near Kingston, it flowed out of him with very little musical training, relying on feeling his way with a great musical ear, he wrote a piece in the English choral tradition that sounds like William Walton or Stanford. The Lord is my strength and my song - great words that act like a banner over his life - that was full of



daily struggles that needed a lot of strength but was always full of song.

Next we heard our French poem: Le Chanson des Escargots read so beautifully by Patrick. Harold always loved the poetry of Jacques Prévert and set this poem to music maybe in the

1990s. You can watch it on Youtube with video he created with granddaughters Hannah and Becca of making snails out sellotape dispensers. There are two points I want to take from this poem - firstly his love, utter love of all languages and especially all things European - he loved visiting Germany, Spain, Italy and above all La France – he was never happier than when he was at Lolivarie in the Dordogne leading us and his cousins on the guitar in a mighty singalong of Beatles songs after dinner under the starry, starry His musical ear gave him the night. ability to speak these languages without an English accent. I always remember being told, "Mais ton papa n'a pas d'un accent!" - but your Dad doesn't have an accent. After teaching boys French he spent several years as a language coach to foreign business men and women teaching them English. He loved language and the fun and laughter that comes from seeking to communicate across different cultures. I would say some of his most meaningful and longlasting friendships were with Conrad and Ursula his choir friends in Wilderhausen, Zsolt and Petra and in these last years, with Patrick. In September this year he and Jane welcomed a Ukrainian family into their home; they also had a dear Hungarian friend staying with them. I remember the buzz in the house just a few weeks ago when I brought my dad back from choir practice and found such laughter as the Hungarian was helping the Ukrainians with their English over dinner. This was just heavenly for Harold and he dived into the hubbub and when I saw him the next morning he said

hadn't been able to sleep because he'd got too excited by it all.

The other point I wanted to take from les escargots - the snails - is his love of the ridiculous, of nonsense and eccentricity dialed up to the max. If there was a warm tea cosy in the room he could not resist putting it on his head. In fact this was his morning tradition, pouring the tea, putting the tea cosy on his head and eating porridge from the pan with a wooden spoon - sitting there happily, looking like some crazed porridge-eating bishop of breakfast. He'd love making up nonsense stories for us when we were children which included the characters Schmozzle and Balyhoo who would go to sea in a bath full of cold custard. My girls asked if Grandpa would get his bath of custard in heaven. I think the answer is definitely 'yes'.

Next we have our jazz group. And Barbara you have been one of his most faithful friends over the years. Jazz was the obvious next step for someone who had such a natural ear for melody and harmony and it flowed from hearing his dear mum - my Granny Ma - singing the songs of Cole Porter and Jerome Kern in her kitchen as a boy. In lockdown he started a tradition of opening his garden and gathering musicians and locals for jazz and coffee using it as an opportunity to raise money for Parkinsons UK. It featured all these faithful jazzers down here. These sessions continued right through to this summer. He always chose a song to sing that he could use sneakily to serenade the love of his life, his wife Jane - even while she was getting coffee for people - she got serenaded on a regular basis! Time after






Time was his favourite song to sing – he felt so lucky to be loving you.

And so we move on through the service to the reading from Paul's letter to the Ephesians, which his dear cousin Barbie will read. One of the effects Parkinson's disease, that Harold found hardest, was his inability to sleep well. One evening a couple of weeks before he died, I was with him helping him to bed. He said he wanted to read this prayer and we read it together and before we'd finished he'd dozed off into peaceful sleep. He was a man of faith in Jesus and this prayer is about being filled with the love of Jesus in every dimension so that you are absolutely filled up as human to overflowing. And Harold overflowed with love. To his wife, to his family, to me, to his grandchildren, to pretty much everyone he met. Rachel, my wife, was telling me about her first ever visit to Grove Cottage when we were dating. She said she enjoyed meeting my mum who was polite and kind, but the experience of meeting my dad was like being greeted by a Labrador. Who was this man running up the drive to meet his son's girlfriend on her first visit? He loved Labradors, his dog Barney and Barbara's Phoebe - and he had Labrador love bounding, exuberant, affectionate.

And so we move to the last pieces: his anthem 'Peace, Silence and Wonder' and the final 'Amen Chorus' from Handel's Messiah. He had the most beautiful baritone voice and I got to sing next to him a lot. Whenever we sang the Amen at the end of Handel's Messiah he would lean over to me and say – this is what I imagine heaven to be like and on

another occasion - this is how I want leave this world - led off by the bass/baritones in full voice. And on 17th October 2024 when the consultants agreed with the family that his injuries were too great, they prepared him and we put this music by his ear and let him slip away. We played it twice and then we played his Christmas choir piece 'Peace, Silence and Wonder' during which he left us. When Alan says the final blessing he won't say the word 'Amen', instead we are inviting all the basses and baritones in the church and in the congregation to boldly lead us off, and then the tenors, altos, sopranos anyone who wants to sing to join in to send him off into the great Amen, the great word of agreement, the great word of affirmation, 'yes', 'So be it', 'Well done', the great welcome of heaven for Harold Townshend Chaplin."

# Knight's maestros return

Forbes Mutch reviews folk singer Peter Knight's Gigspanner Big Band, back at St Andrew's in November at their own request.

Six musicians walk onto the St Andrew's Altar Stage, pick up their instruments and start playing a soft, lilting melody that grows like a musical tapestry until all the players are engaged and interweaving with such assurance and self-confidence and creativity that the sum of the parts seems greater than six; they sound more like a small folk orchestra.

At the end of the opening number, the audience applaud and the bearded fiddle player on the left of the lineup steps forward to the microphone and says: 'Thank you, it's good to be back'.

This is band leader Peter Knight; his group is the legendary Gigspanner Big Band and returning they are indeed, having played a sensational gig here in February 2023. They are here again at their own request. 'Can we come back?' they asked.

It makes you wonder why they want to return to play to an audience of 170 in a small church in Hertford when they regularly top the bill at folk festivals, such as Shrewsbury last year, in front of 7,000 people. They are so renowned on the folk circuit that they could arguably fill the Royal Festival Hall in London or even the Royal Albert Hall. So why St Andrew's? The answer comes at the end of the gig.

When you start talking about music and you mention 'folk' to the uninformed, many people imagine a lone singer in a single spotlight, perched on an empty stage or in the corner of the pub, strumming an acoustic guitar. This image will most likely be based on the folk genre of the 1960s; the acoustic heyday of Bob Dylan, Leonard Cohen, Joan Baez and many more.



But folk music is nothing like that today. In fact, it started changing in the late '60s, with the introduction of amplified instruments, drum kits and a growing interest in songs sourced beyond the traditional songbook of England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland. At the vanguard of what became known as the folk-rock movement were Fairport Convention and Steeleye Span. Fairport, as you know, are still around, as they have played two massively successful concerts at St Andrew's in the last couple of years. The Steeleye personnel changed many times over the years but, at their peak in the 1970s and '80s, Peter Knight was an integral part of the band.

In his own folk ensemble today he is joined by Bellowhead founder-member John Spiers on melodeon; vocalist and fiddle player Hannah Martin, guitarist and harmonica player Phillip percussionist Sacha Trochet and guitarist Roger Flack. Together, they are able to deliver one of the most inventive sets of folk songs heard in recent times, a powerful and energetic mix of traditional English and Irish music, plus, as the Big Band name suggests, a strong influence from the world of jazz. Throw in a hint of blues harmonica, country slide guitar and



Asian tom-tom percussion and you question whether this is really 'folk' at all.

Their set list on this November night in St Andrew's includes one or two new songs but mostly old favourites, such as the opening Suffolk Miracle and a tune that Hannah Martin calls a song of worship (appropriate for tonight's church setting) called What Wonderous Love is This. The seven-song first half ends with an extended version of Rolling the Stones, which Trochet sees Sacha abandon surprisingly his

tom-toms to pick up a bass. Versatile musicians, or what?

The tempo picks up in the second half, with jigs and reels, such as *Bonny Black Hare* and *Betsy Williams*, but also includes the 18-verse *Hind Horn* which allows Hannah Martin to showcase her pure voice, backed by the vocals of all the other band members. They seem so



sound.

At the end of the concert, I ambush Hannah Martin as she makes her way down to the back of the nave to meet the audience and sign CDs. I ask her the question that has been perplexing me throughout the gig: 'The band is so good, why do you want to play St Andrew's Hertford?' Without moment's hesitation, she

smiles and says: 'It's a really good place to play. The acoustics are great, the people are friendly, there's a good atmosphere and, well... we enjoy it here'. She smiles again and nods her head. I watch her shimmer down the church aisle and think, see you next year, then.
