OUR LEGACY

For many thousands of people, the wildfires that ravaged Los Angeles in January took almost everything. When finally, the embers cooled, they returned to their destroyed homes to discover if they could salvage anything of value. For many it was the small things which managed to bring the biggest smiles.

For a líttle boy, ít was a toy lawnmower he'd purposefully hídden ínsíde a bush. For others, ít was a Chrístmas ornament, a Dr. Seuss book, two pearls from a necklace and two survíving díshes from a great-aunt's dínner servíce.

Such a devastating experience can teach us the true value of the little things.

If you had to salvage just one thing from your home, what might that be?

I imagine it would be something irreplaceable, something sentimental; something that reminds us perhaps of someone we love.

I remember once walking along the beach on Holy Island in Northumbria and coming across the ashes of a bonfire. Among the ashes I found an iron nail, a hacksaw blade and a metal circular disc of unknown function. These alone had survived the flames. As I held them in my hand, they

assembled themselves into a Celtic cross. And that day I was reminded that the only certain thing that lasts is love itself. As Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 'Love never fails' Everything else in



time perishes, except for love. It's the only legacy we leave that ripples on in the future.

People sometimes ask me about what lies beyond this life, and 1 have to be honest and



say that that remains for all of us a mystery. The Bible has very little to say except for the story of the One who returned from death, and whose first word to his frightened friends was 'Peace'.

what I do know is that love never fails; that every act of love, great and small; every sacrifice; every kindness, every kiss, has a life that goes on. These things are not lost in the fires we call death. And, that's the most beautiful thing I can live by. Every act and word and gesture of love that I show today, whether it's reciprocated or not, lives on. This is our legacy.

We are looking forward to Away Day 2025 which, this year, takes place on Sunday 4th May at All Nations College on the Easneye Estate the other side of Ware - just 12 minutes' drive from Hertford.

We will explore the theme of Peace. This will be done through words, prayer, music and a range of activities that should offer lively and stimulating insights into the need for peace in our personal lives as well as in the wider world. There will also be time to experience the College's beautiful grounds.

As always, we welcome those of all ages including children and young people for whom activities will be organised. Also, this year, we particularly look forward to welcoming those who have joined our church in recent times.

The day will start with coffee at 9.30am, and then a short introductory all-age session with worship, followed by some deeper reflection for the adults and separate activities for the children and young people. There will be a range of exciting workshops (we've already confirmed the always popular singing workshop, an art-based activity and a discussion group on Peacemakers). We'll then have a hot lunch (Sunday Roast with veggie options), some free time and a concluding Eucharist for all ages. The day will end with a cup of tea at approximately 3.45pm.

Please note that there won't be a 9.15am service at St Mary's or a 10.30am service at St Andrew's that day. There will be a short 8am service at St Andrew's.

The cost of the day, including lunch, will be £40 per adult with Under 18s attending free of charge. In previous years, some have offered to increase their payment towards the cost for others and this has always been welcome and helpful.

ALAN'S SABBATICAL

Every ten years, vicars are offered the opportunity to take a three-month sabbatical (or Extended Study Leave). The object of the sabbatical is to recharge spiritually, make time for creativity and to engage in an area of study which is relevant to ministry. Between May and July this year, I will be taking a sabbatical from parish life. My plan is to study the Irish Wake and Irish traditions and rituals around death and dying, which will take me on a road trip around Ireland, culminating in the Keening Festival in the west of the country. I also plan to retreat to Northumbria, deepen my Mindfulness practice, take up pottery and fit in a holiday to Sorrento! I'm really looking forward to it and I'm hugely grateful for the opportunity. I know that I'm leaving both parishes in the very safe hands of Rev Bill, the wardens and the Ministry Team.

My last day will be Sunday 4th May which is our joint Away Day.

BISHOP ALAN ANNOUNCES HIS RETIREMENT

The Right Revd Dr Alan Smith, Bishop of St Albans, has announced his intention to retire in 2025. His letter to the Diocese is published in full below:

Dear friends and colleagues,

It has been the privilege of my life to serve as the Bishop of St Albans. However, next month I will be 68 and the time has come for me to lay down my responsibilities and to hand the baton of leadership on to whomever the Lord calls to succeed me. I am writing, therefore, to tell you that, with the support and permission of His Majesty the King, I will be retiring as Diocesan Bishop on 31st May 2025.

The past sixteen years have been full of challenges, opportunities and surprises. With God's help, I have encouraged us to 'Live God's Love' among the people of Herts, Beds and Luton and parts of Barnet, and to do so with generosity and joy, with imagination and courage. In that endeavour, I have been grateful for my colleagues on the senior staff and for the support of so many clergy and lay people across the Diocese. I never cease to give thanks to God for the warmth of your friendship. You have enriched my life and ministry in countless ways.

I plan to retire to Wiltshire, the county in which I was born and brought up, and where most of my extended family continue to live.

There will be plenty of opportunities to say our farewells in the Spring. In the meantime, I have many things I still want to do in my remaining months in office as I seek to serve God and prepare for the next phase of my life and ministry.

LENT

Ash Wednesday (5th March) is the first day of the season of Lent. Christians use this season to prepare for the great Feast of Easter, when we celebrate that Love conquers death, at the resurrection of Jesus. During these forty days many people give things up as a sign of getting ready and making space to welcome in the love of God. But it is also a time of giving to other people, and for repenting the things that separate us from God's love. Having ash put on our forehead is a badge to remind us of these things and gives this day its name, a custom which began in the Middle Ages. At St Andrew's there will be two services on Ash Wednesday, at 10.30am and 8pm.

The calculation of the forty days of Lent has varied considerably in Christian history. It is now usual in the West to count them continuously to the end of Holy Week (not including Sundays). Churches are kept bare of flowers and decoration. The Fourth Sunday of Lent (Refreshment Sunday) was allowed as a day of relief from the rigour of Lent, and the Feast of the Annunciation almost always falls in Lent; these breaks from austerity are the background to the modern observance of Mothering Sunday on the Fourth Sunday of Lent.

The Church of England's Lent theme for 2025 is:



This Lent we are encouraged to put down deep roots of hope by connecting with God who is with us at all times.

In Lent we journey with Jesus on the difficult and thorny road that leads all the way to the cross on Good Friday – and beyond, to the transformation of Easter Day.

God invites us to bring to him our own journey through everyday life. In the disappointment of daily setbacks and the pain of deeper hurts, we discover that God is present with us. And God promises a future where all things are healed and made new.

Living Hope offers us the opportunity to deepen our hope in God and be part of what God is doing to bring hope in the world.

The readings and reflections explore how we can have hope in times of frustration or uncertainty; the hope found in joining with others; the invitation to notice signs of hope around us; the courage to face reality and pursue a hopeful future; and the ways God transforms death into life at Easter.

You can sign up to receive Lent reflection emails and daily messages straight to your inbox. These will offer Bible readings, short reflections and a practical challenge, as well as prayers linked to weekly themes. 

CHILDREN AT ST ANDREW'S

Children are never too young to come to church. You and your children are very welcome at St Andrew's. We realise that bringing children, especially babies and toddlers, to church can be challenging to say the least, so we have set aside part of the church (the Children's Corner) at the front of church (to the right of the altar) which is equipped with toys, books, craft materials and a space to call their own. Here, even if they are occupied with a toy or book, children absorb the atmosphere of worship.





LISTENING TO THE DESERT WIND

Forbes Mutch reflects on the temptation of Christ in the wilderness



Thinking about Christ's time in the wilderness, I was wondering what it was really like to be in a desert. The nearest I've come to that kind of terrain is standing

outside Pheonix in Arizona, which is a bit tame, considering that there was a 7-11 diner less than five miles away.

Jesus didn't have that nearby comfort or luxury.

It is widely assumed that Jesus was tempted in the Judean Desert, also known as the Desert of Judah or the Judean Wilderness. It is located southeast of Jerusalem, along the western shore of the Dead Sea.

What was it really like?

Close your eyes for a moment and imagine a landscape of hard rock mountains and deep canyons, torrid heat, harsh sunlight, cracked earth, wind whistling, faraway eagles calling, the sound of your own steps, arid air, dust in your dry mouth, grit on your tongue, the smell of your own sweat, an insatiable thirst and hunger, pain from split lips and dehydration, cramp in your legs. It is not a pleasant experience.

In the Judean desert, summer temperatures rise to over 45C (or nearly 120F in old currency). There's hardly any rainfall in the Judean desert (less than 50mm a year); nothing really grows there, apart from a few scrubby bushes and flowers, which means any animals that survive there – a few scorpions, reptiles and skinny mammals, such as gerbils, foxes and wolves – are hungry and therefore dangerous.

It makes you wonder why the Holy Spirit - to quote Mark's gospel – immediately drove Jesus out into this inhospitable environment for 40 days without food.

Well, the answer is that, historically, a wilderness was always God's favourite place for a conversation or a proving ground.

For the People of Israel and many of their leaders, the desert was a place of testing, encounter, and renewal. When the Israelites were freed from slavery in Egypt, they wandered for 40 years in the wilderness. This was seen as a time of purification and preparation for entry into the promised land.

Moses went to the mountain of the Lord in the Sinai wilderness and stayed there for 40 days and nights in prayer and fasting.

Elijah, after he was fed with bread from heaven, journeyed through the wilderness without any food for the obligatory 40 days.

So, it shouldn't be surprising that Jesus is in the wilderness for 40 days, because God wants a conversation with him about his big upcoming mission. Satan is there to do a bit tempting.

The word 'tempt' in English usually means to entice someone to do what is wrong or forbidden. The scriptural word used here also means to 'test' in the sense of proving and purifying someone to see if they are ready for the task ahead.

Talking of translations, the Hebrew word

for the desert is MIDBAR. Because there are no vowels in Hebrew, the letters that spell it out are M-D-B-R. Coincidentally, this is also how you spell another Hebrew word, MEDABER – to speak.

I like Mark's account of the temptation. I used to spend many hours reading my parents' collection of Readers' Digest magazines, including the publication's condensed books. Do you remember those? You could read a shortened version of a Dickens' novel in a couple of hours.

Mark's version of the desert temptation is like that. John and Matthew go into much more detail in their gospels, telling us what Satan said and what Jesus said and all that stuff about stones and bread. Mark cuts to the chase, with no frills. Jesus was in the wilderness forty days, tempted by Satan and the angels waited on him. That's it, end of story. The Readers' Digest version.

But short is powerful in this case. Mark's succinct passage is enough to remind me that this is Christ being his most human on earth. He has a wilderness experience, just as **we** have wilderness experiences in our own lives; where we wandering around not feel alone, knowing what to do or where to turn. The COVID pandemic and lockdown felt like a wilderness time for many people. A major health issue, trouble at work, relationship breakdown, these are some of the desert phases that people travel through in their lives.

And yet, while those times may be painful, true to form, it is in the wilderness that God often speaks most loudly to us. We don't necessarily meet Satan, but we come face to face with the reality of our lives. And, to use that translation of temptation, we are tested. I don't believe God puts temptations in our way to see if we can resist to prove our faith, but I do believe God allows us to wander in the desert sometimes to remind us how much we should depend on him for strength, direction and guidance.

As we begin to observe our 40 days of Lent, we might be sacrificing some luxury items in our lives as a symbolic gesture to purify ourselves before Easter. But, as we start contemplating the torment of a day ahead with no biscuits, alcohol, cream cakes or Maltesers, we have to remind ourselves that it's not going to be as bad as the 40 days that Christ spent in the Desert of Judah. And if you are in a bit of a personal wilderness, worrying about something in your life, listen out for the still small voice of God, because, chances are, he's trying to have a conversation with you in the silence of the desert.

Prayer

Jesus, Lamb of God,

when you walked this earth you did not consider heavenly equality, though that was yours to choose. Instead, you took the role of servant, and in humility and obedience allowed the hot sun to burn your skin, the desert wind to dry your lips, the cold nights to make you shiver, And, in the end, the rough nails of our sin to be hammered into your flesh for the sake of our salvation. And so it is that we acknowledge you as Lord of all, to the glory of God the Father, Son and Spirit, Three. Amen



THE BEATITUDES

The Beatitudes - a series of blessings from Jesus that sum up Jesus' teaching about what it means to follow Christ. Jesus gives us a vision of a world redeemed by love, and the qualities of discipleship which will bring about that transformation.

They can be found right at the beginning of a long passage of teaching by Jesus in Matthew's Gospel, known as the Sermon on the Mount. Just as Moses taught the people of Israel from the mountain after he had received the Commandments, so Jesus begins his ministry by going up a mountain and teaching his disciples.

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted.

Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth.

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst after righteousness, for they shall be satisfied.

Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy.

Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God.

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God.

Blessed are those who suffer persecution for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Some of these sayings are difficult to understand, and some are uncomfortable for us today as they would have been to Jesus' first hearers. In a recent sermon (which can be found with many other sermons on the church's website), Rev Alan refers to having written a few years back his own Beatitudes which began,

'Blessed are the hopeless cases, the lost causes, the misfits, the disposable, for you will be valued in the household of God'.

He challenges each one of us to write our own beatitudes.

St Andrew's Men in the Morning home group decided to take on this challenge recently. They came up with the following:

Blessed are those who think before speaking and pray before acting.

Blessed are those who know when to keep quiet and to listen to what others have to say.

Blessed are those in the NHS frontline who keep calm and look after us, often under great pressure.

Blessed are the joy bringers.

Blessed are those who speak truth unto power.

Blessed are those whose glass is half empty.

Blessed are the abused and the exploited.

Blessed are the forgotten.

Maybe these will inspire you to have a go at writing your own Beatitudes.

LOCAL CHARITIES

WORKING IN THE COMMUNITY

Street Pastors, Hertford & Ware, are part of a national team first pioneered in 2003.

Street pastors are trained volunteers from local churches who care about our community, and particularly about people in the nighttime economy.



They can be on patrol from 10.30pm up to approximately 2am on a Friday or Saturday night to care for, listen to and help people who are out on the streets.

They are led by a local co-ordinator and also have support from local churches and community groups in partnership with the Hertfordshire Police, East Herts Council, the town councils of Hertford and Ware and other statutory agencies.

Their operational strength is currently 11, and as such they are still typically operating only two patrols a month. Hertford, and particularly Ware, continue to be much quieter than before the pandemic and increased policing means that that typical patrols are going out till 2:30am, rather than the 3-4am as was the norm before the pandemic. Over the Christmas holidays they patrolled on the Saturday before Christmas and New Year's Eve. On both occasions, Hertford was very busy, but very friendly with few problems and the Street Pastors had many meaningful interactions and discussions.

David Elder, the Co-ordinator, continues to meet with police, the council, and the licensing officer on an ad hoc basis. He then feeds back operational information to Hertford & Ware Street Pastors on issues in the town from the previous weekend and future events that may require a larger presence on the streets.
