

A Flower and a Missile

2022 Ukrainian In composer transformed an unexploded Russian bomb, which had fallen on his homeland, into a musical instrument of hope. Roman Hryhoriv replaced the explosive interior of the missile with cello strings, and its sound has been described as haunting or funereal. 'This isn't just an instrument to me' he explained, 'it transcends music. symbolises the horror experienced by the Ukrainian people. No other instrument can come close to its power and outpouring of pain'



At Easter, churches all over the world display their own instruments of pain in the shape of a cross. It took the early church centuries to depict a cross; such was their trauma. The cross has with time become for many not only a symbol of pain and death, but a symbol of God's empathy and love and triumph over death.

At church during Lent, we create a cross made from last year's Christmas tree, which reminds us of both the birth and the death of Christ. On Easter Day we then transform this into a symbol of rebirth or resurrection as people are invited to bring fresh flowers and insert them into the cross. What was dead, comes to life; what was ugly becomes beautiful; a defiant reminder that love always wins.

Each person is invited to make their flower a prayer of hope. This Easter, what might your prayer be for yourself and for the world? Do come and join us on Easter Day and bring that prayer with you in the form of a beautiful flower.

Welcome Scott! Introducing Scott Martin

I'm delighted to let you know that Rev Scott Martin will be joining the ministry team as Associate Priest serving the people of St Mary's and St Andrew's. His permission to preach has now been granted by the Diocese – Rev Alan

We are delighted to welcome Scott who will obviously be playing an important role at both churches particularly as we prepare for Rev Alan's upcoming sabbatical. We look forward to welcoming Scott at our St Mary's service on Sunday 13th April. In the meantime Scott has kindly prepared his own introduction below

"I was born in Enfield in 1973 and grew up in a happy family in Cheshunt attending Goffs School. I had a happy childhood and fond memories of my early years. I was a keen amateur bird watcher and still love visiting RSPB nature reserves to this day. After finishing my GCSE's and leaving school in 1989, I worked in banking for a short while. After deciding this wasn't for me, I became involved in the horticultural industry where I spent most of my early working life. I really enjoyed working alongside Mother Nature and the seasons of the year in Crews Hill, Middlesex. It was during these years that I began to discern a possible vocation to either the religious life or the priesthood. As my sense of calling to the priesthood began to develop, so did my interest in the more academic side of things. In 1996 I went to the University of Hertfordshire to study for a degree in philosophy and later in 2002 as part of my ordination training, I attended Leeds University and gained a master's degree in theology and Pastoral Studies.

I can't quite recall when I first became aware of the Christian faith. As I was not brought up in a church going family, I assume it would have been through school visits to church services and religious studies at secondary school. I remember requesting a children's Bible one Christmas and became fascinated with the stories and pictures of Jesus. I also remember watching Franco Zeffirelli's Jesus of Nazareth on the television at Easter, which made a very strong impact upon me. Family holidays to Spain and Cyprus in my teenage years involved opportunities to visit Catholic and Orthodox Monasteries which absolutely fascinated me! I started to attend my local church in my late teenage years where I began to serve at the Eucharist and began to explore and learn about Christian discipleship which eventually led to confirmation. I was very lucky to have had an encouraging parish priest who journeyed with me throughout the whole discernment process of considering ordination. When I was eventually recommended for ordination training, I went to the College of the Resurrection in Mirfield, Yorkshire for three years. From there I served my curacy at St Luke's Church in

Leagrave Luton and eventually went on to become a Priest in Charge at Holy Trinity Church, Bishop's Stortford.

My connection to St Andrew's started In 2013 when I was going through a period of illness, which resulted in putting life in ministry on hold. My family and I moved to Hertford from Bishop's Stortford and were very fortunate to have been visited by Alan Stewart who kept a pastoral eye on us all. Over the years, I have got to know the people of St Andrew's and have enjoyed becoming part of a friendly and welcoming church community.

Since moving to Hertford, my week involves a daily commute into London where I work in tailoring/menswear at a company called Turnbull & Asser. It's a fascinating place to work as you never now who is going to walk through the shop door, from politicians to movie stars! When I'm not working, I enjoy spending quality time with my children Charlotte (15) and Andrew (13). I also enjoy country walks, the cinema and always have a book or two on the go!

Three words to describe me? "Journeying in faith"

My favourite passage in the bible has always been the story of the Prodigal Son. To my mind, it's one of the best depictions of the love and nature of God. Here we see a young person caught up in the frailties and vulnerabilities of being human, not being perfect in other words! When he comes to the realisation of his true needs... his True North who is God, he doesn't find a stern judge waiting to condemn, but a loving Father running over the horizon with arms open, eager to welcome him home. That's the God I believe in!

My favourite hymn is "I heard the voice of Jesus say" by Horatius Bonar. This hymn has helped me through some difficult times in my life. It is very much a light in the darkness hymn. I just love the imagery used throughout. There's a real sense of Christ and therefore God being our true place of anchorage and rest. It's a hymn that's really there for you as a reminder of where discipleship begins and finds its fulfilment."

Thank you Scott. Your presence will be a massive benefit to both churches and we look forward to welcoming you at St Mary's on 13th April

Rev Alan's Sabbatical

Every ten years, vicars are offered the opportunity to take a three-month sabbatical (or Extended Study Leave). The object of the sabbatical is to recharge spiritually, make time for creativity and to engage in an area of study which is relevant to ministry. Between May and July this year, I will be taking a sabbatical from parish life.

I'm really looking forward to it and I'm hugely grateful for the opportunity. I know that I'm leaving both parishes in the very safe hands of Rev Bill, the wardens and the Ministry Team. My last day will be Sunday 4th May which is our joint Away Day

Encouraging Wonder!

We are continuing to highlight some of the very meaningful messages from our church sermons, not only by Revs Alan & Bill, but also by our inspiring team of Lay Readers of Worship. This month Rev Bill reflects on what useful things we might try to do

Here is Rev Bill's sermon from the Ash Wednesday's service...

Recently, Elon Musk sent an instruction to all Federal employees to send him every week an email listing five useful things they had done that week. Failure to comply would be deemed to be a resignation. Mr Musk may come to realise that you do not win friends and influence people that way; and did he really expect to get truthful replies? It is, nevertheless, a valuable discipline to look back over a period – maybe a week, maybe a day – and think what good or useful things you have done in that time.

Such as? Well, here are some ideas. They are not very original, and they would not appeal to Mr Musk, but Jesus might be more encouraging. I had thought of sorting them into loving God and loving neighbour, but they overlap too much, so I will just go through more or less at random.

Encourage wonder.

Too often, worry or hurry crowd out wonder. So, make space for wonder. Some people find wonder in mathematical equations (not my personal cup of tea) or the vastness of the cosmos. More concretely, if you have bird table, wonder comes to you. Be amazed at how cheeky robins are. Or look at a dunnock. Ostensibly, this is just a small brown bird, but spot the subtle colouring on its body. If you are out walking, stop and look around and look up, maybe at a soaring tree, or look down, perhaps at a tiny flower or a strange fungus. Stop and carry on refreshed and reminded of the wonderful and precious world God has put us in.

Take time to talk with God.

This is easy if you are happy or if you have an urgent ask of God. But don't hide if you are upset or disappointed with life or with God. Read the Psalms. The Psalmists let it all hang out.

They may be praising God, or they may be asking him to destroy their enemies, or they may be scolding God for being unfair or for letting them down. And definitely don't forget to listen to God – prayer is a two-way thing. And while you're at it, don't forget to listen - really listen - to other people. Listen to what they say; and to what they do not say; and to what they would like to say and try not to interrupt.

Encouraging Wonder!

Be grateful.

Complaining that other people are not being grateful enough has been in the international news this week, which is more about the donor's sense of entitlement.

On a more modest scale, it is right to be grateful for any good thing in life. A meal eaten with gratitude is sweeter. Gratitude also reminds us that very few things can be said to be entirely our own work. "We plough the fields and scatter..." but God ensures the harvest. And think about all the effort by other people which makes our life run smoothly and enables our enjoyment.

Think of cleaners, caterers, delivery drivers who bring what we want and binmen who take away what we do not want; even the traffic wardens without whom we would not be able to use the short-term parking spots opposite the church. And, if we feel grateful, we ought to say so.

Be kind.

This seems obvious. The Bible tells us to love our neighbour as ourselves. In Charles Kingsley's "Water babies," one character is Mrs.

Doasyouwouldbedoneby. Maybe even better would be Mrs

Doastheotherwouldliketobedoneby.

How we love ourselves might not be how the other would want to be loved. It should be about the receiver not the giver. Maybe my custom of thrusting home produce at people is about me as much as about them.

Kindness is also behind the good Lent tradition of giving up something. Kindness to the world by reducing unneeded consumption and kindness which can be shown with anything saved by self-denial.

Pocket an insult.

There will have been occasions when we have been hurt or offended or insulted by someone else. Sometimes those stay with us. Sometimes they perch on our shoulder and loom large. Take the hurt or offence or insult and put it in your pocket out of sight. Pull it out occasionally and polish it like a cricket ball but mostly leave it there. Give up resentment for Lent.

Happy Lent!

I have never yet been wished a Happy Lent. Will 2025 be the first?



"One Friday" exhibition at St Andrew's The story of Holy Week in watercolours by Jenny Hawke

Artist and writer Jenny Hawke (1954-2023) created a moving and thought-provoking series of watercolour paintings entitled One Friday. Her pictures depict the events of Holy Week, from Jesus' betrayal up to his death and resurrection. We will be displaying large-format prints of these motifs at St Andrew's Church during Holy Week. There will be an optional written reflection on each picture, or you can simply take in Jenny Hawke's visual interpretations of the themes.

There are fourteen paintings in the One Friday series — the same number as the traditional Stations of the Cross. But One Friday goes beyond simply narrating the story of Christ's Passion. Each motif carries a one-word title, such as Fear, Mercy or Tomorrow, and the representations range from the literal (a hammer and nails) to the near-abstract; the motif Tears, for example, is a poignant cascade of pale blues inspired by the idea of the whole of creation weeping.

The traditional Stations of the Cross came about as a way of enabling those who could not make it to Jerusalem on pilgrimage to take their own small walk of faith in their locality. The One Friday exhibition, in a modern-day twist, now invites you to step into the unfolding drama of the Passion story and immerse yourself visually in the events of Holy Week.

The pictures will be on show at St Andrew's from Monday 14 April until Friday 18 April (Good Friday), during the church's normal opening hours.

Cherish Hertford Blessing

A special event called 'Cherish Hertford' was held at the Castle recently, hosted by The Mayor, Rachel Carter, a member of St Mary's. The event was also the culmination of the Mayors writing competition on the theme "Hertford's Magical Rivers" which saw nearly 80 entries from children and adults. Participants gathered for an afternoon of reflection and appreciation of our wonderful community. Our own Rev. Alan, who is the Mayor's Chaplain, gave a Cherish Hertford blessing, during which water from the four rivers, Rib, Beane, Lea and Mimram was poured into a bowl.

The words of the blessing are shared with you here...

(A central bowl. Four bottles of water, one harvested from each river. Four volunteers who, when invited, pour their water into the bowl, symbolising the coming together of community.)

The nature writer Robert MacFarlane writes: 'Rivers run through us as surely as they run through places.'
So, to begin, a moment just to be still, to reflect personally on all that we cherish about this community



Four rivers meet in this County Town; a rare chalk-stream confluence of Rib and Beane, Mimram and Lea. Four rivers; habitat to houseboats and kayaks, mallards and moorhens, otters and water voles; four rivers meet in this town we, too, call home. And each river brings with it life and blessing.

Water from the Rib

As water always takes the shape of the thing that holds it, may we learn to walk humbly in the shoes of one another. May we cherish our unity and our diversity and may we continue to be a place of welcome and belonging for all.

Water from the Beane

As water is rich in minerals, a biodiversity of flora and fauna; may we delight in and cherish all that enriches this community; its arts and music, its charities and volunteers, its businesses and faith communities, its schools and emergency services; all ages, all cultures, all abilities.

Cherish Hertford Blessing

Water from the Lea









World Book Day 2025

Friends of Panshanger Park

Panshanger Park is a wonderful natural area within our wider community and so the Friends of Panshanger Park are sharing some of it's history - some of which will include the village and greens and some not.

This month Charles Runcie remembers more tales surrounding his Godmother Joan Middleton, known to all as Miss Midd. She was a remarkable horsewoman who lived and worked at Panshanger Stables from the 1950s-1980's

MORE MEMORIES OF 'MISS MIDD'



In the December/January issue I recalled Miss Midd's prowess as a riding mistress and trainer, based at Panshanger Stables, and the hundreds of children and their parents she inspired with her calm, firm but fair training. She also coached the Enfield Chace Hunt pony club team to win the prestigious Prince Philip Cup at Wembley's Horse of the Year Show in 1961, a competition designed to find the country's best equine mounted games team. Through the 1960's and early 1970's her teams regularly reached finals week, enhancing her reputation even further in the pony world. She also invented many themes for fancy dress and the riding club competitions locally and further afield

During the 1970's Miss Midd added yet more skills to her repertoire. With her talent for equine fancy dress, in 1972 she was asked to choreograph a mounted performance of the pantomime 'Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs' at the new Christmas Show at Olympia in London. Naturally she used ponies and children drawn from the Enfield Chace and Panshanger Stable

The show director was one of her former riding pupils, an equestrian businessman better known as BBC showjumping commentator Raymond Brooks-Ward. He knew what she was capable of, and it was a great success

For the next few years no Olympia performance was complete without an end-of-show pantomime, with dozens of children and a few adults suitably dressed for a performance of 'Dick Whittington' or 'Aladdin.' Even Father Christmas charging in on his 'sleigh' was another of Midd Midd's Panshanger pals, Sue Rogers on board her smart driven team of four greys. In the mid-1970's Miss Midd decided to pass on ownership of the riding school she'd set up back in the late 1930's to new younger owners. Remarkably she continued to live in her comfy upstairs flat by agreement with the aggregates firm who had bought the park. She'd have hated staying anywhere else! She had by this time become busy as one of the organisers of the Prince Philip Cup itself. Every year she and her helpers, including Albert Murdoch and later Les and Beryl Oakes, travelled around the country during the school summer holidays. For many weekends this small band of faithful friends helped pack up all the equipment stored at Panshanger, to drive all over the UK and help Miss Midd as she judged the various

Prince Philip regional qualifying rounds. Many were held at Butlin's holiday camps during their heyday, when the company sponsored the Mounted Games.

Then come October, out came the equipment to be cleaned in the stable yard, then driven to finals week at the Horse of the Year Show. In front of thousands of spectators and millions watching on TV each evening, Miss Midd would oversee the competition from inside the ring, then resolve any disputes afterwards. There were few - no-one would dare argue with her decisions! There were other mounted games events to run, even occasionally taking British teams to shows in Paris and Amsterdam. All masterminded from that upstairs flat at Panshanger. Those two annual events, Wembley and Olympia, would occupy a large part of Miss Midd's year until her final retirement in the mid-1990's.

Miss Midd died in March 2002 after a short illness aged 92. She is commemorated locally, firstly by a residential street in west Hertford near Panshanger Park called Middleton Gardens, and secondly the award of the Middleton Trophy annually by the Enfield Chace Pony Club to a junior member who has been a good ambassador for the Club. I sometimes wonder what might have happened in another age, when women like Miss Midd would have been able to go to university and hold down top jobs. She would have been a firm but fair boss, I'm sure, but I also can't help thinking would have been horse or pony not far away.

That she was never able to was Panshanger's gain, and for the hundreds of pupils that passed through those gates into the magical equestrian world of Panshanger Stables.







WALTER WALLINGER CHARITY

Walter Wallinger died in 1709 leaving "Four hundred pounds for the placing of poor children of this Parish as Apprentices."

Times have moved on and the trustees of the charity now take the view that the income from the endowment should be used to give grants for educational purposes to people under 25 who have for at least two years lived, or been educated, within the ancient parish of Hertingfordbury which today roughly means Hertingfordbury village and the five Greens and outlying houses.

Something of the order of £1500 is available annually. Typically grants are one-off payments not exceeding £450 for something that will help with the applicant's education in a broad sense, such as a musical instrument, specialist equipment, a field or other course. Grants are available to anyone in school, FE or Higher Education.


