A FLOWER AND A MISSILE

In 2022 a Ukraínían composer transformed an unexploded Russían bomb, which had fallen on his homeland, into a musical instrument of hope. Roman Hryhoriv replaced the explosive interior of the missile with cello strings, and its sound has been described as haunting or funereal. 'This isn't just an instrument to me' he explained, 'it transcends music. It symbolises the horror experienced by the Ukraínían people. No other instrument can come close to its power and outpouring of pain.'

At Easter, churches all over the world display their own instruments of pain in the shape of a cross. It took the early church centuries to depict a cross; such was their trauma. The cross has with time become for many not only a symbol of pain and death, but a symbol of God's empathy and love and triumph over death.

At church during Lent, we create a cross made from last year's Christmas tree, which reminds us of both the birth and the death of Christ. On Easter Day we then transform this into a symbol of rebirth or resurrection as people are invited to bring fresh flowers and insert them into the cross. What was dead, comes to life; what was ugly becomes beautiful; a defiant reminder that love always wins.

Each person is invited to make their flower a prayer of hope. This Easter, what might your prayer be for yourself and for the world? Do come and join us on Easter Day and bring that prayer with you in the form of a beautiful flower.

HOLY WEEK & EASTER



Artist and writer Jenny Hawke (1954-2023) created a moving and thoughtseries provoking of watercolour paintings entitled One Friday. Her pictures depict the events of Holy Week, from Jesus' betrayal up to his death and resurrection. We will be displaying largeformat prints of these motifs at St Andrew's Church during Holy Week. There will be an optional written reflection on each picture, or you can simply take in Jenny Hawke's visual interpretations of the themes.

There are fourteen paintings in the One Friday series – the same number as the traditional Stations of the Cross. But One Friday goes beyond simply narrating the story of Christ's Passion. Each motif carries a one-word title, such as Fear, Mercy or Tomorrow, and the representations range from the literal (a hammer and nails) to the near-abstract; the motif Tears, for example, is a

poignant cascade of pale blues inspired by the idea of the whole of creation weeping.

The traditional Stations of the Cross came about as a way of enabling those who could not make it to Jerusalem on pilgrimage to take their own small walk of faith in their locality. The One Friday exhibition, in a modern-day twist, now invites you to step into the unfolding drama of the Passion story and immerse yourself visually in the events of Holy Week.

The pictures will be on show at St Andrew's from Monday 14 April until Friday 18 April (Good Friday), during the church's normal opening hours.


The three groups will gather at the following locations between 10am and 10.15am:

The face of Scott Martin will be familiar within St Andrew's to many congregation. He has worshipped at St Andrew's for a while and has led intercessions at Sunday morning Now, he will be playing a services. greater role in the life and work of St Andrew's having accepted the appointment of Associate Priest to serve with the parishes of St Andrew's and our sister church, St Mary's Hertingfordbury. This could not have come at a better time with Rev Alan soon to be enjoying a well -earned three-month sabbatical.

We asked Scott to tell us a few things about himself and this is what he had to say.

Please tell us where you grew up and a little about your upbringing, education and career paths.

I was born in Enfield in 1973 and grew up in Cheshunt in Hertfordshire. I grew up in a happy family where there was always lots of fun and laughter. My father Dennis was a tradesman and mother Jean a part-time Bank Clerk. I have one brother called Neil who is two years younger than me, and lives in Arkesden. I attended Goffs School in Cheshunt. I had a happy childhood and fond memories of my early years. I was a keen amateur bird watcher and still love visiting RSPB nature reserves to this day. After finishing my GCSEs and leaving school in 1989, I worked in banking for a short while. After deciding this wasn't for me, I became involved in the horticultural industry where I spent most of my early working life. I really enjoyed working alongside Mother Nature and the seasons of the year in Crews Hill. It was during these years that I began to discern a possible vocation to either the religious life or the priesthood. As my sense of calling to the

priesthood began to develop, so did my interest in the more academic side of things. In 1996 I went to the University of Hertfordshire to study for a degree in philosophy and later in 2002 as part of my



ordination training, I attended Leeds University and gained a master's degree in theology and Pastoral Studies.

Please share with us your Christian journey.

I can't quite recall when I first became aware of the Christian faith. As I was not brought up in a church-going family, I assume it would have been through school visits to church services and religious studies at secondary school. I remember requesting a children's Bible one Christmas and became fascinated with the stories and pictures of Jesus. I also remember watching Zeffirelli's "Jesus of Nazareth" on the television at Easter, which made a very strong impact upon me. Family holidays to Spain and Cyprus in my teenage years involved opportunities to visit Catholic Orthodox Monasteries absolutely fascinated me! I always came home with lots of devotional memorabilia and developed an interest in the religious icons of the Orthodox Church. I started to attend my local church in my late teenage years where I began to serve at the Eucharist and began to explore and learn about Christian discipleship which eventually led to Confirmation. I was very lucky to have had an encouraging parish priest who journeyed with me whole throughout the discernment process of considering Ordination. I

remember having lots of interesting discussions with him about theology and life! He had a well-stocked bookshelf which I enjoyed making good use of! When I was eventually recommended for Ordination training, I went to the College of the Resurrection in Mirfield, Yorkshire for three years. From there I served my curacy at St Luke's Church in Leagrave, Luton and eventually went on to become a Priest in Charge at Holy Trinity Church, Bishop's Stortford.

What brought you to St Andrew's?

In 2013 when I was going through a period of illness, which resulted in putting life in ministry on hold, my family and I moved to Hertford from Bishop's Stortford. We were very fortunate to have been visited by Rev Alan Stewart who kept a pastoral eye on us all. Over the years, I have got to know the people of St Andrew's and have enjoyed becoming part of a friendly and welcoming church community.

What do you do between Sundays?

Since moving to Hertford, my week involves a daily commute into London where I work in tailoring/menswear at a company called Turnbull & Asser. It is a long twelve-hour+ day – on the train at 7.30am and returning home at 8pm - but it is also a very fascinating place to work. You never know who is going to walk through the shop door, from politicians to movie stars! When I'm not working, I enjoy spending quality time with my children Charlotte (15) and Andrew (13). I also enjoy country walks, the cinema and always have a book or two on the go!

How would you describe yourself in three words?

"Journeying in faith"

What is your favourite passage in the Bible and why?

Admittedly, it's a bit longer than a passage...It's always been the story of the Prodigal Son. To my mind, it's one of the best depictions of the love and nature of God. Here we see a young person caught up in the frailties vulnerabilities of being human, not being perfect in other words! When he comes to the realisation of his true needs... his True North who is God, he doesn't find a stern judge waiting to condemn, but a loving Father running over the horizon with arms open, eager to welcome him home. That's the God I believe in!

What is your favourite hymn and why?

"I heard the voice of Jesus say" by Horatius Bonar. This hymn has helped me through some difficult times in my life. It is very much a light in the darkness hymn. I just love the imagery used throughout. There's a real sense of Christ and therefore God being our true place of anchorage and rest. It's a hymn that's really there for you as a reminder of where discipleship begins and finds its fulfilment: I heard the voice of Jesus say "Behold I freely give the living water; thirsty one, stoop down and drink, and live."

How are you preparing for Alan's sabbatical?

Mostly by getting to know the people I'll be working with, the Ministry Team and the Churchwardens and getting to know the members of the PCC. Everyone has been so welcoming and encouraging as I prepare to become an associate priest at St Andrew's.



HERE AT ST ANDREW'S

SOME IMPORTANT MONEY FACTS AND FIGURES





It is easy to underestimate what has to be paid for but we need to include heating, lighting and utilities, insurance, repairs and maintenance, employment costs, administrative expenses and everything that is required for services, including music.


Like all Anglican churches, we are asked to make a contribution, called the Parish Share, to support ministry and mission across the Diocese. This includes the cost of clergy stipends and their housing. The amount of Parish Share is based on a formula that reflects the size of the parish, congregation numbers, social economic factors (ie ability to pay) etc. In 2024, this totalled £80,299.

We also supported Christian charities through our mission giving to the tune of £8,378 in 2024.

We are completely reliant on these efforts to ensure we can continue and develop our activities as a flourishing, well-maintained church.

We are now three months into the new financial year. The budget for 2025 has been agreed by the PCC and is being closely monitored. Our costs inflationary increases and our total expenditure is expected to increase to £148,000. We can see that challenges are presenting themselves repairs urgent to guttering, stonework, glass and electrical items. We also await the church 'quinquennial inspection' which is a report from our architect on the fabric of the church.

The budget agreed by the PCC for 2025 includes the ambition of increasing our planned giving by individuals and

So where better place to start than our own backyard (and front yard); our churchyard?

How many of you noticed the wonderful array of crocuses during late February and early March this year nestling in the

How many plants are in ou churchyard?

Debbie reckons we have at least 150 different plants and trees (and she is still counting)! What an amazing array. We will shortly be displaying the list in the church.

How did our plants get there?

Some have been planted having been gifted, while others have turned up, blown in by the wind or helped on their way by birds, bees and other insects and animals. What Debbie has learned over the nearly twenty years she has been looking after this lovely space, is that plants tend to choose their favourite places.

Does the churchyard need managing and why?

The simple answer is yes! Debbie does a fantastic job, not least, because she

knows her plants and where they reside. That is no mean feat. Working with our Godcreated world is the best way to encourage diversity of plants and species, so she takes the approach of letting

plants find their place. But she also knows that our churchyard is an oasis in an urban area. Whilst nature can work its magic there are some thugs out there that outcompete everything. Some plants (Laurel hedging for example) need pruning from time to time to allow other plants to naturally colonise, whilst in the right place additional planting of native plants can help boost what is already there. If we nurture and care for our plants, we can have many habitats and flowers throughout most of the year.

What can you spot in April and beyond?

The churchyard provides an incredible array of habitats. See what you can find in April. Bluebells, grape hyacinths, early violets, and tulips are just a few you will see. Get spotting and let Debbie know what you find.

Help us record what we have

Caring for God's Acre is a conservation charity for Burial Grounds across the UK. From the 7th - 15th June there will be a national count although you can send data any time. You can find the app (or print off a paper recording sheet) at:

On 23rd February, the Mayor of Hertford hosted an event at Hertford Castle called 'Cherish Hertford', bringing together representatives from across Hertford's communities, including faith groups, charitable organisations, community groups and others who are recognised for their contributions to the town.

Guests enjoyed an afternoon of reflection and appreciation for Hertford's people and its environment, while being treated to performances from the newly-formed Hertford Children's Choir, led by Rachel and Sam Chaplin, and the Take Note Choir plus a reading from local writer Martina Swift.

The event was also the culmination of the Mayor's Writing Competition, on the theme 'Hertford's Magical Rivers', which saw nearly 80 entries from children, aged from 7 years to adults. The entries were

Powerful church players return

Two impressive concerts in March kickstarted this year's folk calendar at St Andrew's. Forbes Mutch tells us more.

CHURCHFITTERS: they came, they played, they conquered. That was in December 2023 when they put on a brilliant Christmas cracker of a show. So pleased were they with St Andrew's, they returned to the church in March this year for a more traditional but equally diverse and entertaining show of virtuosic folk music.

Although the band has changed many times since it was first formed in 1978, the current line-up of Rosie Short, her brother Chris and Boris Lebret has been playing together for over 20 years and their comfortable camaraderie is evident on stage and adds to the enjoyment of a relaxed and memorable evening.

They start with no preamble, going straight into a Rosie Short song called which begins with Amazing, appropriate lyric: I loosen my tongue as you turn to stare. The tempo picks up immediately after that with a reel called Tongue Twister, where the musicians begin to demonstrate their mastery of different instruments. Throughout the show, Rosie keeps picking up her whistle and often swaps her quitar for a banjo. During the evening, we see Chris play fiddle, mandolin, whistle and musical saw; a flute, dulcimer and ukulele make their appearance, while Boris amazes us with a



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




six-string bass banjo, bing-bong-box and a homemade electric hub-cap bass-bouzouki. It is no wonder that these three friends fill the church with so much sound.

Their choice of music is equally diverse, with a mixture of traditional and original folk songs, each introduced by a quirky and amusing anecdote. These are often about where they have lived over the years, including Suffolk and Brighton (unusual people live in Brighton) and Boris Lebret's homeland in Brittany (better than Croydon). Sneaky cover unexpectedly slip into repertoire. An old dark folk tale called The Lady of York (a cruel mother) morphs, for example, into a melody by American R&B band Booker T & the MGs called Soul Limbo, which is better known as the theme tune for TV's Test Match Special. This gets a special cheer of recognition. Towards the end of the second half - the finale, in fact - they a tongue-in-cheek version play Australian rock band AC/DC's Thunderstruck. The audience clap their hands and stamp their feet.

During the interval, I comment to Rosie that it's appropriate for each of the band to wear a yellow daffodil motif, as it is St David's Day. The singer corrects me, saying that they always wear Marie Curie daffodil badges in memory Churchfitter's founding member Anthony McCartan, who died from cancer in 2004. The encore at tonight's gig, played in memory of McCartan, is called Grain of Sand. In slang, a grain of sand is often used to symbolise a small contribution to a bigger collective goal. When we all pitch in something to a common cause, we can make great things happen. Churchfitters prove that, on stage, they are always a band greater than the sum of their individual parts. A great gig. Will they return next year as well? We hope so.

The second folk concert in March, saw a couple of exceptional musicians play a rich variety of interesting songs, relevant for the modern age.

DUO OF DIVERSITY



I grew up in Nottingham and so, when **Miranda Sykes** says that she studied for a BTEC in pop music

at Ilkeston College, located between Nottingham and Derby, I know exactly the country she's talking about. It's a semi-urban, semi-rural town caught between the factories and coalmines of the industrial midlands and the rugged beauty of the Peak District. This contrast seems appropriate for a musician who grew up learning classical double bass but ended up in a punk band. Maybe later finding her niche in the world of folk, between her original extremes of music, was inevitable. In her gig at St Andrew's, she forsakes her double bass for an amplified six-string auitar. She's versatile.

Her partner on stage is **Jim Causley** who, after attending Newcastle University where he studied Folk and Traditional Music, became, in his own words, a 'folk singer and accordionist, who also plays piano when there's one available!' He performs a mixture of traditional, original and self-penned material, as well as musical settings for the poems of his relative; the poet Charles Causley. CONTINUED

When Jim and Miranda arrive in Hertford, they are coming to the end of an intense 24-gig tour of England, travelling in Miranda's van. 'Last night we were in Totnes' Jim says, 'tomorrow we'll be in Manchester'.

The show starts without an introduction, with Jim playing accordion, before Miranda picks up the tune on her quitar. They settle into а comfortable partnership, playing 18 songs either side of an interval. This must be a record for the number of songs at a folk gig at St Andrew's. Most of the tunes are cover versions of songs by more famous songwriters but the variety of choice is remarkable, ranging from Ralph McTell to Prince, Cyndi Lauper to John Denver.

Despite the disparity and history of the songs, they all have a relevance for today's audience. Highlights in the first half include a version of the Jim Croce song *Time in a Bottle*, which includes the lyric: *There's never time to do the things you want to do*. How true is that in the modern world?

In the second half, apart from a Woody Guthrie song called *Way Over Yonder*, that Jim credits Billy Bragg with discovering, the highlight is a John Denver anti-war number called *Let Us Begin*, which some of us think would be a suitable song for this year's church awayday, where the theme is 'peace'.

During the interval (and after the show), Jim chats to the audience and Miranda sells jewellery that she makes from sea glass found on the beach near her home in Devon. A versatile lady, indeed. May they both return soon.
