



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Billboards of the Sky



Billboards are a common sight alongside many roads. Their function is of course to grab our attention in order to sell us things. highway the By а on Canadian/US border however, there is a billboard with a difference. It consists of thousands of steel rods which create an illusion of a ghostly billboard which frames, not a poster advertising fast food or the latest brand of deodorant, but the sky itself.

Created by a group of artists called Lead Pencil Studio, this billboard isn't trying to sell us anything. Instead, it's an invitation to look again at the beauty of the sky and the landscape we so often rush through.

It reminds me of that famous poem by William Henry Davies which ends with the lines 'A poor life this if, full of care, we have no time to stand and stare'.

Modern life is so full of distraction. Often, we are so preoccupied that we miss the miracles around us. The antidote, as this billboard reminds us, is to immerse ourselves, where possible, in the natural world.

The best way I know to recalibrate and reconnect is to get lost in nature. It's here I'm replenished. It's here I gain perspective and reassurance. It's here I'm reminded that I am part of something much, much bigger.

Nature is a kind teacher and friend. It's here we connect with our Source; with the Ground of our Being; with our soul and with whatever it is we call God.

So, where possible, go outside and let nature teach and befriend you. Contemplate. Let the seasons remind you that all things pass. Let the canopy of the sky cause your eyes and heart to lift. Let the forests enfold you and the oceans still you. Rev Alan





BEDS & HERTS Historic Churches Trust

Bike 'n Hike 14th September 2024

The result of the 2024 Bike 'n Hike in aid of Beds and Herts Historic Churches Trust has been published. There are 21 areas within the Trust and our Parish is part of the Hertford Deanery, which comprises 37 Churches of which 18 participated in this annual event.



The Bike @n Hike is the most important fundraiser for the Trust and is key to enabling it to continue to give grants to Churches and Chapels for the care and repair of their buildings, which are so important to the lives of our towns and villages.

In the Hertford Deanery, 42 people were actively involved, amongst them 5 from St Mary's. As a whole the Trust raised £103,647.12 from the event, which exceeded the target of £100,000.00. The Hertford Deanery raised £9,878.76 and the contribution from St Mary's was £1,834.26 (including Gift Aid).

In the area covered by the Trust there were a total of 169 Churches taking part and a total of 465 people were actively involved.

I'd be Proud to be a Donkey

We are continuing to highlight some of the very meaningful messages from our church sermons, not only by Revs Alan & Bill, but also by our inspiring team of Lay Readers of Worship. This month Lay Reader Geoff (partly edited) reflects on the events of Palm Sunday and Jesus entering Jerusalem on a donkey.



Palm Sunday

Whenever we have a bible reading with a good story to it, like Palm Sunday, I often like to ask myself where we might find ourselves among the characters we hear about. If this was a play, what part would be yours?

In one sense, for Palm Sunday we had already chosen our part. A procession into our church.


Just a bit of theatre, in an English village churchyard? Well, yes and why not? The whole of Palm Sunday was itself a stunning act of political theatre.

Jesus, usually so reticent about declaring who he is, goes public in typically Jewish fashion. He let's them proclaim him as the new King. A King riding on a donkey, promised by the prophet Zecharia 400 years before. The palm branches, a joyful procession to the Temple, the cloaks on the ground, the messages were clear.

But can we really claim a place in that crowd? We have read of only a short journey from Bethany to Jerusalem, 2 miles maybe. But for the crowd it is the culmination of a Passover pilgrimage. They are Galileans, northerners, they have already walked 90 miles or more to get to Bethany. It is the long walk of faithful pilgrimage and patience that earns them a place in that crowd. Have we done what it takes to earn our place on the stage?

Jesus, like his followers, knows he is an outsider. Galileans have a different dialect, suspect manners and questionable ethnic heritage. The Judean establishment views them with anxious suspicion. The Palm Sunday procession has a destination; the Temple. The embodiment in stone of Judea's faith and national identity. There will be rejection, and upheaval. If Jesus is the new cornerstone, building must begin again from the very foundations upwards. All that is there now, must first be brought down. Are we, the pilgrim crowd, ready for that challenge?

There's another crowd in Jerusalem already. We will meet them outside Governor Pilate's residence five days from now, the Pharisees who plead with the pilgrims to calm down and keep quiet. That crowd is not ready for the challenge, not ready for the radical renewal Jesus offers. They have not made the pilgrimage, and like most 'insiders' they are happy to defend their status quo. Let us take care that we do not find ourselves in that crowd when the chips are down.



The Donkey

But now on a lighter note let's go back to the character in the drama that didn't join us for our procession on Palm Sunday – the donkey!

It is perhaps unfortunate that to our modern, western and largely urban mind, donkeys are imagined as either cute, or ridiculous. Donkey rides are for children. They were once a staple of English seaside holidays – you'll still find them at some of the more retro resorts and at petting zoos around the country.

But to our eyes an adult riding a donkey looks clumsy and out of proportion, and of course donkeys – along with their near-cousins the mules – are proverbially stubborn and uncooperative. Not what you want when you are a Messiah needing to make a big entrance into your capital city.

But that is not what 1st Century Palestinian people saw. The donkey was the go-to working animal, the white van of its day, and the minibus. Hard working, reliable and cheap to run. Adaptable as a draft animal, a pack animal or even for passenger transport. In the rough, hilly environment of Judea and Galilee, it was also wonderfully sure-footed, because donkeys have the brilliant gift of a very wide field of vision; they are one of the few animals that can look ahead where they are going, and see their own back legs at the same time!

But donkeys, significantly, did not do war! Old Zechariah promises a king who comes in peace and humility. He contemptuously waves away the horses that draw the chariots of Kings and noblemen into battle. A King who is one of us, not one set above us.

Much of the world still uses donkeys. A few years back I encountered working donkeys, to my great amazement, in the streets of Cairo – pulling their carts in the morning rush hour, weaving amongst the motorised traffic. The motor vehicles – an incongruous mix of businessmen's Mercs, battered old pick-up trucks and cheap Asian cars – swerved, surged and braked chaotically through the congestion. In contrast the donkey carts skipped through the spaces with confident agility and complete disregard for traffic rules, and I pondered ruefully that I would probably have had a quicker, safer and less bumpy journey on a donkey cart than I did in my chauffeur-driven BMW!

Maybe that's another reason Jesus chose a donkey to get him to the Temple – an example to us. We are also called to carry Christ to where he needs to go - to the temple of our humanity in all its frailty, in all its need of restoration and reconstruction. He needs people who are used to covering the miles and carrying the burdens, reliably, unfussily, coping with the busy traffic of life however it confronts us, living humbly and peacefully, and bravely. He needs people with that divine gift of a wide field of vision that sees the wonders and needs of the world and the safe paths to travel through it. He needs people who can hold in one vision the often difficult reality of where we are now, and the beauty of we are called to be. If that's what a donkey can do, **I'd be proud to be a donkey – for Christ.** Geoff Oates



Friends of Panshanger Park

Panshanger Park is a wonderful natural area within our wider community and so the Friends of Panshanger Park are sharing some of it's history - some of which will include the village and greens and some not.

Almeric Paget Massage Corps

This month Geoffrey Cordingley recalls Almeric Paget and his wife Pauline who spent time at Panshanger and who set up the Almeric Paget Massage Corps in the First World War which turned out to be a forerunner to modern physiotherapy that we know today.

Almeric Hugh Paget, (14/3/1861 – 22/9/1949), was born in London, the sixth and last son of Lord Alfred Paget. His grandfather had commanded the British Cavalry at the Battle of Waterloo.

After a brief spell working for Midland Railway he emigrated to the USA where he travelled around, establishing a cattle ranch in Iowa, was an estate agent in Minnesota, before joining his brother, Arthur, in New York. There he met and married the American heiress Pauline Payne Whitney in 1895.

The same year, the Pagets moved to England, ostensibly for Pauline's health, where initially they lived in Suffolk and had two daughters. Olive Cecilia and Dorothy Wyndham.

Paget was an accomplished yachtsman and he became MP for Cambridge in 1910, holding the seat until he relinquished it in 1917.

Almeric made a most important contribution to the War effort when he formed the Almeric Paget Massage Corps in August 1914. Pauline had suffered from diphtheria in 1894 and one of the reasons the couple moved to England was ostensibly for Pauline to be nearer European spas with easier travel to milder countries in the winter. She also gained significant relief from massage treatment.

The Pagets agreed to cover the cost of the 50 fully trained masseurs in the Massage Corps who initially were based in British military hospitals. With the significant increase in the list of casualties, this number was quickly increased to 100. In March 1915 the Army Medical Service, announced that the Government would take over funding of the Corps and it would henceforth be known as Almeric Paget Military Massage Corps. Although the corps was named after Almeric, it's thought that Pauline was the driving force behind the massage efforts and possibly much of the original funding.

In 1914 the Pagets rented Panshanger for the summer – the Desboroughs being elsewhere, e.g. Taplow, London & abroad. Presumably it was now easier to let the house since the previous autumn Lady Desborough had organised a series of improvements which included central heating and new bathrooms; the drains and roof were redone, the bells electrified and five lawn tennis and one hard court laid. Richard Davenport-Hines in his book, Ettie, claims that the central heating was 'installed throughout' but I suspect he meant through the

Desborough's, visitors' and entertaining rooms. It's difficult to believe that Ettie, who was always careful with money, made much change to the service rooms such as the kitchen and the servants' quarters. It's believed that these improvements were funded by selling the small Raphael 'Madonna and child' for £70,000 (£6m today).

Pauline took a great and presumably protective interest in the women masseurs but unfortunately she died on 22nd November 1916. Interestingly her will stated that her fortune would be divided between her two daughters and they carried on funding work in massage. Pauline is buried with a memorial in St. Mary's Churchyard, Hertingfordbury.

In January 1918, Paget became Lord Queenborough. Further massage centres were added to Army camps and at the end of the war there were 2,000 masseurs in the service. Men blinded in the war were also trained as masseurs.

Almeric Paget rented Panshanger again in 1918 for two years. Ironically the Desboroughs 'camped out' in the house whilst Ettie organised the cleaning of the house from January to March 1920 after this two year let, so, in spite of his support for massage, cleanliness does not seem to have been a priority for Almeric, or perhaps Ettie was just over fussy.

Almeric married Edith Starr Miller in 1921 and they lived at Camfield Place, Hatfield until they separated in 1932. Almeric died in September 1949 in Hatfield having made a considerable contribution to helping the recuperation of Great War soldiers and laying the foundations for modern physiotherapy.

Footnote: Their daughter, Dorothy Paget (21/2/1905 - 9/2/1960), was a well known racehorse owner and gambler who must have got her interest from her mother's Whitney family whose family were one of the most prominent thoroughbred horseracing and breeding families in America. She too is buried in St Mary's Hertingfordbury churchyard next to her mother's memorial.




Volunteers needed to open/close St. Mary's

WALTER WALLINGER CHARITY

Walter Wallinger died in 1709 leaving "Four hundred pounds for the placing of poor children of this Parish as Apprentices."

Times have moved on and the trustees of the charity now take the view that the income from the endowment should be used to give grants for educational purposes to people under 25 who have for at least two years lived, or been educated, within'the ancient parish of Hertingfordbury' which today roughly means Hertingfordbury village and the five Greens and outlying houses.

Something of the order of £1500 is available annually. Typically grants are one-off payments not exceeding £450 for something that will help with the applicant's education in a broad sense, such as a musical instrument, specialist equipment, a field or other course. Grants are available to anyone in school, FE or Higher Education.
