



BILLBOARDS OF THE SKY

Bíllboards are a common síght alongsíde many roads.

Their function is of course to grab our attention in order to sell us things. By a highway on the Canadian/US border however, there is a billboard with a difference. It consists of thousands of steel rods which create an illusion of a ghostly billboard which frames, not a poster advertising fast food or the latest brand of deodorant, but the sky itself. Created by a group of artists called Lead Pencil Studio, this billboard isn't trying to sell us anything. Instead, it's an invitation to look again at the beauty of the sky and the landscape we so often rush through.



It reminds me of that famous poem by William Henry Davies which ends with the lines 'A poor life this if, full of care, we have no time to stand and stare'.

Modern life is so full of distraction. Often, we are so preoccupied that we miss the miracles around us. The antidote, as this billboard reminds us, is to immerse ourselves, where possible, in the natural world.

The best way I know to recalibrate and reconnect is to get lost in nature. It's here I'm

replenished. It's here I gain perspective and reassurance. It's here I'm reminded that I am part of something much, much bigger.

Nature ís a kínd



teacher and friend. It's here we connect with our Source; with the Ground of our Being; with our soul and with whatever it is we call God.

So, where possible, go outside and let nature teach and befriend you. Contemplate. Let the seasons remind you that all things pass. Let the canopy of the sky cause your eyes and heart to lift. Let the forests enfold you and the oceans still you. Alan

Ascension Day Service Thursday 29th May

8pm at St Andrew's

Jesus said, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.' John 20:17.

The Feast of the Ascension, or Ascension Day, is one of the highest feast days in the Christian year when we remember Jesus' bodily ascent into heaven. The Ascension is a celebration of the triumph of the risen Lord. It signifies the completion of Christ's work on earth and his glorious entry into heaven, and signifies also the birth of the Church.

The Ascension appears in the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke and the Book of Acts. It sets the stage for the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Jesus had instructed his disciples to stay in Jerusalem and wait for the gift his Father had promised, saying they would be baptised by fire and the Holy Spirit, that they would receive power, and be his witnesses throughout the world. Thus, with Jesus' departure, the responsibility to continue his work on earth shifted to his disciples and, by extension, to us (the Church).

The Ascension not only recalls Jesus' ascent into heaven but also anticipates his promised return. Our service will commence at 8pm on Thursday 29th May.

CHILDREN AT ST ANDREW'S

Children are never too young to come to church. You and your children are very welcome at St Andrew's. We realise that bringing children, especially babies and toddlers, to church can be challenging to say the least, so we have set aside part of the church (the Children's Corner) at the front of church (to the right of the altar) which is equipped with toys, books, craft materials and a space to call their own. Here, even if they are occupied with a toy or book, children absorb the atmosphere of worship.

Junior Church

During the 10.30am Parish Communion on Sundays in term time, there are activities for children in the St Andrew's Centre. Every Sunday except during the All-Age Service (usually the second Sunday of the month), the children will begin the service with the congregation and then, after the first hymn, they leave to join Junior Church.

All-Age Services

These are monthly, shorter, childfriendly, interactive communion services with songs and prayers which are held once a month: usually but not always on the second Sunday of the month. Children stay in church for the whole of the service.



MAPPING CHURCH SERVICES LOCALLY

Shirley Taylor reports on the most recent Hertford and Ware Deanery Synod meeting

Your three Deanery Synod reps – Jenny Aitken, Renee Booker and Shirley Taylor went over to Christ Church, Ware for the latest meeting to enjoy the plush surroundings, tea, cakes and underfloor heating in the church, and also to take part in the business on the agenda.

The main business of the meeting was for the Deanery to find out what services each church holds throughout the year, be it regular Sunday morning and midweek services, online transmission of those services or specially run online services, worship in the churchyard or outside elsewhere, one-off services such durina the year as our Bereavement Service, and Fresh Expressions like our Beer and Carols.

We were each given an outline of our Parishes and filled in the details and then put our parishes together to make a jigsaw of the whole Deanery which was photographed. We also sat with other Parishes to chat and see what they were doing which we could replicate in our own setting.

Renee learnt of a church holding a short formal prayer service which was accessed by landlines or mobiles for people who did not or could not use computer technology.

We also received a report from the recent Diocesan Synod which explained the General Synod's position on safeguarding that had been misreported in the Press. The INEQE Safeguarding Group has been appointed by the Archbishops' Council to conduct independent external audits of the

What is the Deanery Synod?

The Deanery Synod is the church governance equivalent of a district council. It comprises elected lay members from the parishes and serving clergy.

Hertford and Ware Deanery is a collection of parishes which stretches from Hunsdon and Widford in the east to Essendon in the west, from Ponsbourne in the South to Aston and High Cross in the North.

England dioceses Church of and cathedrals, focusing on safeguarding arrangements. Their findings "highlight a positive trajectory, reflecting improved safeguarding practices led by Diocesan Safequarding Teams. These teams comprise individuals with significant experience of working in statutory and agencies other relevant organisations, ensuring a robust and informed approach to safeguarding within church settings. and found them to be good". The Church of England is moving towards independent external scrutiny of safeguarding.

Other News – The Bishop of St Albans – Alan Smith retires on 31st May and his successor when recruited, is unlikely to be in post before September 2026. In the meantime Bishop Richard of Bedford will be in charge with Bishop Jane of Hertford assisting him.

The Rev Jenny Gray (St Mary the Virgin Aston, St Andrew's Bramfield, St Mary the Virgin Stapleford, St Michael and All Angels Waterford, St Andrew and St Mary Watton at Stone) is retiring on 2nd June.

The Rev Jake Pass – Curate of St Mary's, Ware to be Team Vicar of Christ Church, Waltham Cross.

CELEBRATING WITH FLOWERS

ROSEMARY WILLIS ON THE WHYS, WHEREFORES AND HOWS OF FLORAL DECORATION IN CHURCH

Traditionally during Advent and Lent we tend not to have flowers in church. These are solemn periods of reflection and penance, not celebration times, and perhaps flowers would be a distraction. When we do have flowers for celebration, we like to make a good show. At the same time we are trying to be more sustainable and eco-friendly.

On Easter Sunday the church was bedecked with wonderful displays of flowers and the Lenten bare cross (made from the church Christmas tree) was covered with flowers by members the of congregation on Easter morning.

When decorating the church we use flowers from locally grown

sources and some which are fairly traded. Flowers are also donated from parishioners' gardens to be used at big celebration times and sometimes for funerals. Occasionally we use artificial flowers to augment the displays. These have not been bought especially for church but have come from our own resources found over the years. Our churchyard, so beautifully kept, supplies foliage throughout the year. We try to use methods of displaying flowers other



concerning composting some garden waste. We hope you enjoyed the celebration flowers for Easter most of which were locally sourced and when they are over they will likely be planted in the churchyard. 






SAVING OUR HISTORIC CHURCHES HOW YOU CAN DO YOUR BIT: PETER ASKS US TO UP OUR GAME

Peter Ruffles reports another successful year for the Sponsored Bike 'n Hike in 2024.

This is the annual fund raiser for Beds and Herts Historic Churches Trust. Churches of all denominations open each September to welcome good people who travel by any means they choose between Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire churches, and beyond. At St Andrew's Carol Muhr's team welcomed, fed, and watered, 50 such visitors and some of us took ourselves on bike or foot to clock in at other churches. We raised £577, and of that sum half went into the Trust's coffers enabling trustees to award building repair grants to churches often



in desperate need. Half is returned to us, here at St Andrew's to help us with the on-going fabric repair.

The most

startling statistic isn't our own contribution, though, and I hope we can manage better on 13th September 2025 (save the date, young and all!) ... the startling news is that on that single day in September 2024, the event raised £103,647! It means that significant help be provided (often to small can congregations with national heritage listed buildings to maintain without national government help). In recent times we've been assisted by the fund ourselves, as has St Mary's Ware; Christ Church, Ware; Ware's Leaside Church,

We really should 'up' our support for others in 2025 and as individuals enjoy a happy day or half day of church checking either very locally or perhaps further afield.

MY DREAM – A YEAR OF SILENCE

In industry, in the public services, in commerce, in churches, in synods, the cry is always the same: 'More communication is needed'. When I hear this my heart sinks - because in industry, common with the public commerce, churches services, and synods I drown under "communication". Letters, emails, messages, phone calls come at us from all directions and do so with relentless and mind-numbina frequency. I suspect that most of us don't need more communication at all, we need less. And that is especially true of our own church: have there ever been so many messages marked "urgent" in our entire history?

If I could dream a year for our Church it would be a communications-free year. I don't mean 'no sermons', I don't mean 'no teaching', though if less equalled better I'd plump for that. I mean a year of silence, a year when the whole Church could wait in stillness upon God: a 'close-down-the-system' year in which we spent time in quietness and adoration of God's most holy and most beautiful presence.

Perhaps I may put it another way: Jesus spent thirty years saying, as far as we know, nothing. The Church has spent the last two thousand years saying things endlessly. A year of self-imposed silence and stillness would be balm to our minds, bodies and souls.

It's probably an impossible dream but if there were an organisation for those who feel compelled to speak called 'Talkers Anonymous' many of us might want to seek their help. In the deluge of noise, the silence of God's love is kept at bay. My future year would not only be marked by silence, however. It would also be marked by a desire, within the Church, to pay proper gratitude and respect to those who work at whatever is called the 'centre' be that in Church House, Westminster, the Diocesan Office, the Deanery Synod or the Vicarage. We are brilliantly served as a Church by some verv self-effacing and dedicated Christians who use their aifts of administration for the good of all. They deserve a year in which appreciation is expressed. And what about beyond the confines of the Church?

Like everyone I long for peace and justice and have the utmost admiration for those within government and charities who work tirelessly for those causes.

My dream then is for a Church which discovers the profound stillness of waiting on God, and for a Church which looks outward to the nation, to Europe and to the world; a Church characterised by Christ's ability to listen and be still and yet having the utmost confidence in God's over-arching, redeeming resurrection purpose; a Church in which God is at the centre and the world is our home; a church filled to overflowing with the startling hope that, surrounded by the saints, we shall only find and be given our ultimate purpose in the glory of Christ's eternity.

HERTFORD WELLBEING CHURCH

Hertford Wellbeing Church is a ministry based in Hertford run by young adults, for young adults. They are a group of people from various backgrounds who come together to help build God's kingdom, while having fun with one another, by holding activities throughout the week.

It is not a church in a traditional sense holding Sunday services. Rather, its focus is on reaching out to young adults and creating Christcommitted disciples.

It engages with young adults through a variety of activities.

Football: The football group has remained strong with consistently high attendance. We continue to maintain a solid number of 8-12 players regularly attending training sessions. While there have been some changes in individual participation, we have successfully retained the same overall number of players. Overall, the team remains in good shape, both in numbers and enthusiasm.

Bible Study: We've completed both Hebrews and James, despite them being very difficult books of the Bible. Many of the attendees found it good to discuss a lot of difficult topics that emphasise heavily on Old Testament knowledge. We regularly get between 10-15 people joining us, all in various parts of their walks.

Social Media: Rebekah reports: "Around 70% of our viewers on TikTok for our bible study videos were women. This has now changed, and we are now getting about 50-60% views from men on our bible study videos, including the previous ones that originally were more female-dominated in views. Although we have 15 followers at the moment, our views are from around 30% of returning viewers, meaning people are coming back to the page to check for new posts, and our views are increasing, with one of our latest ones reaching over 2000. This is usual for social media nowadays, where people don't often subscribe but visit the page to check back on posts. Depending on the day of posting, views can range between 40-1500 so it depends on the algorithm and day. I have now begun scheduling posts for YouTube as well. We have 8 long-formed videos scheduled at the moment and 26 shorts."

Gaming: Whether young people enjoy shooters, Fifa, or chess, the Gaming Night has something for everyone! Every Friday from 6pm to 11pm, Hertford Town Church at Hartham Lane hosts their Gaming Night. If you're 18 or older and this sounds like something for you, please stop by and say hello as they would love to meet you!

If you're not into games at all, but would rather relax with a cup of tea and talk about anything and everything, there is space for that too, with comfy sofas for you to unwind after a long week.

SON OF MAN

Andrew Rixon delves into the meaning of expressions found in the Bible

A recent gospel reading prompted me to write this. It may well have been the beginning of St. Mark's Gospel, chapter 2. Jesus refers to himself as Son of Man, and this expression appears throughout the gospels. When I was young this puzzled me, and I remember in discussion groups wondering about Son of Man and Son of God. In recent years I have been able to look into it properly.

In the Middle East in Jesus's time Aramaic was the language spoken between the Mediterranean and the Tigris, and was understood in a far wider area because it was the official language of the Persian Empire, which preceded the coming of the Greeks under Alexander the Great. Hebrew was declining and probably only spoken as a living language in Judaea. It finally died three hundred vears about later, although it was widely used as a literary language, and continued to be used so until it was revived as a spoken language early last century. There is a story of two rabbis around 300 AD discussing the precise meaning of a word in one of the post-Biblical decided writings. They to visit a particular rabbi whose household was one of the last still to speak it as a living language. While they were waiting in his house for him to come, they heard the maids chatting in the kitchen. One of them used the word they had been discussing, and how she used it immediately clarified its precise meaning to them.

The first language of Jesus and his disciples was Aramaic, and indeed his name Jeshua is the Aramaic form of the Hebrew Joshua. Aramaic shines through

the Gospels and the Acts, indeed Greek grammars state that New Testament Greek is full of Semiticisms. It was the normal everyday Greek of that time, but even if the gospels were not first composed in Aramaic, that was the first language of their writers in Greek and it shines through. Obviously everything that Jesus said was in Aramaic. Two examples are recorded: talyetha qumi, meaning get up, little girl, and ethpathah, or eppathah, meaning be opened. Incidentally, Abba, which Jesus uses when addressing God, is not "Daddy", as is sometimes claimed, but "O Father"; you only have to go back a couple of hundred years here to find children speaking very respectfully to their fathers, often calling him sir. I should add that in his book Jesus of Nazareth Pope Benedict writes that St. John was not an ignorant fisherman but an educated young man whose father Zebedee was a successful businessman with a fishing business with employees (Mark 1 v.20), and that Zebedee was also a temple priest in Jerusalem, like other priests doing two one-week stints a year.


Over the last couple of hundred years scholars have been looking into colloquial Aramaic of the time of Jesus, gradually emerging from various sources and not found in the exalted style of religious works. Son of Man is a direct translation of a common Aramaic expression *bar nash*; it is just a generic expression a man might use to refer to himself in a fairly deprecating way, and can sometimes just be translated as "one". Oddly, there is a parallel expression in English, probably rather old-fashioned today. For example, someone might say to me "I don't think

I shall be very good at that job" and I might reply "This man thinks you will do it very well." When I say "this man" I really mean "I". I should add that I have not just thought this up myself, but rather read it from authoritative scholars, and I found it in a book called *An Aramaic Approach to the Gospels and Acts* by Matthew Black, not suitable for anyone who cannot read the Hebrew alphabet.

At a similar time to the reading I have been talking about, we had a reading from Exodus chapter 3 about Moses and the burning bush. Moses asks God for his name and God replies "I am that I am". I have examined that for years, and have come to the conclusion that the best translation is "I am that am", meaning "I am the One that truly exists". The verb to be in Hebrew is than stronaer in anv European language and often means to exist. This expression is today often translated as "I am who I am", but that is very unsatisfactory because anyone could say that, indeed Moses could have replied "and I am who I am". The word "who" must be avoided because it is a pronoun but the Hebrew equivalent is a particle. I used Hebrew grammar to work out my translation, and if anyone wants to know how I could explain it to them.

What links the Boston Massacre, Hillsborough Castle, Christ's Hospital and St Andrew's Church?

Let me start with Hillsborough Castle. Located 20 miles south-west of Belfast it is now the official residence of the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland and members of the Royal Family stay at Hillsborough when visiting Northern Ireland.

Hillsborough is a late-18th century Irish "Big House" rather than a castle. It was built by Wills Hill in the 1770s. An ancestor of his had been awarded large tracts of land in the early part of the 1600s for services to the King and gave his name to the village: Hill's Borough. Wills Hill was born in 1718 and was made the 1st Earl of Hillsborough, an Irish peerage, which meant that he could sit in the House of Commons on being elected as an MP. He was appointed Secretary of State for the Colonies in 1768 at a critical period leading towards the American War of Independence.

The Townshend Acts were a series of Acts of Parliament passed during 1766 and introducing 1767 taxes and regulations to enable administration of the British colonies in America. They are named after Charles Townshend, the Chancellor of the Exchequer who proposed the programme. The Acts placed an indirect tax on glass, lead, paints, paper, and tea, all of which had to be imported from Britain. There was widespread protest in America, American port cities refused to import British goods, and the Massachusetts legislature approved what was known as the Massachusetts Circular Letter in which Samual Adams argued that the Acts were unconstitutional because the

> The Earl of Hillsborough ordered the Massachusetts legislature to revoke the letter and authorised the Governor of Massachusetts to dissolve the assembly. which occurred when the assembly voted against revocation. This led to an outbreak of mob violence from colonists who no longer had any legal way to deal with their grievances. In response to the deteriorating situation, Lord Hillsborough sent four regiments of British soldiers to Boston. Arriving in 1768, the soldiers October only increased the tensions leading two years later to what became known as the Boston Massacres when British soldiers fired on and killed civilians. Parliament proposed measures to appease the angered colonists, repealing most of the taxes imposed under the Townshend Acts in 1770. Hillsborough opposed all concessions to the colonists and the import duty on tea was retained in order to demonstrate to the colonists that Parliament held the sovereign authority to tax its colonies. This was badly managed and Horace Walpole called Hillsborough "a pompous composition of ignorance and want of judgement." Hillsborough resigned his office in 1772 and continued to oppose American independence.

The Earl of Hillsborough employed a Steward by the name of B. Burton Esq. His duties will have included complete management issues for the estate itself: hiring and firing of workers, settling tenant disputes, overseeing the harvest and livestock, collecting rents, keeping the financial records, etc. This position was by far the highest ranking

RICHARD TAYLOR SEEKS CLUES THAT BRING HISTORY TO LIFE and most important for the running of estates during this period. The steward was a professional employee, educated, respected, well paid, trusted, and ranked immediately below the Master he served.

It can reasonably be assumed that at some later stage of his life Mr Burton came to live in or around the town of Hertford for reasons I will come to shortly. In his Will, Mr Burton left a substantial bequest to Christ's Hospital of £10,000 3% Bank Stock for the relief of the blind "after the manner and form of the Will of the late Mr Hetherington".

Christ's Hospital school was founded in 1552 by Edward VI who gave land and buildings in Newgate Street and certain funds for orphan children of poor Londoners. In 1682 a site in Hertford was purchased for a boarding school initially for younger boys but joined by girls in 1778 (later to become girls only when the boys moved to Horsham).

Christ's Hospital was financed entirely through gifts from benefactors, including City and Livery Companies. One such gift was made by Mr Hetherington whose gift, enhanced by the generous donation of Mr Burton (£10,000, if that was the value of the stock, would be worth about £1,850,000 today) is now known as the Hetherington Fund for the Blind. Mr Burton will have been familiar with the school as a Hertford resident and, to have known of Mr Hetherington's legacy, must have had some knowledge either of the affairs of the late Mr Hetherington or of the finances of the school.

Mr Burton was buried at St Andrew's upon his death on 14th September 1793 aged 88, the same year co-incidentally as the Earl of Hillsborough died.

So there we have it: the Earl of questionable decision-Hillsborough's making which played a part in the events leading to the Boston Massacre and the subsequent American War of Independence, his considerable estate at Hillsborough, his employment of Mr Burton as his steward from which the latter made a good living, Mr Burton's later life and death in Hertford and knowledge of the good work of Christ's Hospital and the bequest of Mr Hetherington and his burial at St Andrew's.

Bank Stock. for the releif of Blind Perfons. after the manner and form of the Will of the late M! HETHERINGTON.

If you were to walk down the side aisle leading to the chapel of today's church (the old church having been demolished and the current building erected in 1869-70) you will come across a large black tomb stone which bears the words, "Here lieth the Body of B. BURTON ESQR. late Steward to the Rt. Honbl. Ye Earl of Hillsborough who died Sept. 14th 1793 Aged 88 Years. Bequeathed to the Governors of Christ's Hospital £10,000 3 Pr. Ct. Bank Stock for the relief of Blind Persons after the manner and form of the Will of the late Mr. HETHERINGTON."
