THE WORLD NEEDS RAINBOWS

Praying for sunshine, praying for rain, praying for rainbows.

The summer holiday season draws near. Embrace its opportunities for rest, pleasure, recreation and variety. God likes us to get a break. After all, God himselftook the first ever holiday, resting on the seventh day after six full-on days creating the universe. One of His first gifts to us was our first holiday (Holy Day), the Hebrew Sabbath. One day a week to rest and leave behind the cares and labours of the working week, a gift important enough to feature among the Ten Commandments.

And remember, it was a gift, not a rule.

We should also be grateful to Emperor Constantine, sometimes called the Great, the first Roman Emperor to embrace Christianity. I look to the rainbow, the sign our God gave us in ancient times after the great upheaval of the



SOME IMPORTANT FACTS AND FIGURES An article in the April magazine covered the costs of running the church: £2,700 per week not an inconsiderable amount!

So where does the money come from to pay for this?


Whilst St Andrew's is a parish in the Church of England, it is a separate registered charity, with the PCC being the Trustees of the charity. The Trustees must make sure there is adequate income to cover the costs of running the charity.

Over two thirds of the PCC's income comes from planned regular giving by parishioners. This is budgeted to be £102,500 in 2025 (including the tax recovered through the Gift Aid Scheme). The PCC is hugely grateful for all those who give financially. By giving on a planned regular basis (usually via a monthly standing order) this makes it much easier for the PCC to meet costs as they arise during the year. For all those donors who are also tax payers, by signing up for the Gift Aid Scheme this means the PCC can increase the value of donations by 25%. make cashless donations: the contactless point at the back of the church is becoming increasingly popular and there is a donation facility on the church website.

A further 13% of income comes from the investments held by the PCC. These are represented by the property in Calton Ave on which the PCC receives rental income, and some equity investment which are managed for us by CCLA Investment Management, on which we receive the equivalent of dividends.

Finally, we hold a number of fundraising events during the year, from coffee mornings to folk concerts. The total net amount raised through these events (we are budgeting £7,500 in 2025) covers about 5% of the annual church costs.

As mentioned last time, the church faces inflationary pressures and there are new



About 10% of the PCCs income comes from collections in services and other general donations. Apart from the giving of cash, there are ways for individuals to challenges in 2025 with urgent repairs required to the fabric of the building (guttering, glass, lightning conductors, soakaway). Therefore, the PCC is

constantly looking at ways to save money and/or increase income to ensure the parish's finance can remain robust. Every penny helps!

The PCC sets a budget each year aimed at delivering a small surplus. The budget agreed by the PCC for 2025 includes the ambition of increasing our planned giving by individuals and families by £3,000. We hope that those who currently give so generously will be able to maintain or, even, increase the amounts they donate while newcomers to St Andrew's will want to begin a regular commitment, perhaps joining our monthly giving scheme.

The PCC holds some reserves to cover any emergencies that may arise; but these reserves are modest, the equivalent of 3 months of annual expenditure. More next time (October) on the funds held by the PCC and how these are managed to maximise the returns (short-term and long-term).

Do please let me know if there are any specific aspects of the Parish's finances that you would like covered in future articles.




NATURE ROSEMARY WILLIS VISITS HEARTWOOD FOREST



If you looked at my old OS 1997 map of St Albans area there is a smallish plot of land just north of Sandridge and south of Wheathampstead bounded by small pockets of woodland. You might think it was very uninteresting landscape: just a few paths and a farm; nothing to call you here to explore. Back in 2008 that might have been true. The Woodland Trust saw the potential of this area with its ancient woodland and set about transforming the farmland into the native forest largest new in England. Over time volunteers have set over 600,000 native trees to change the land into areas of woodland managed as a natural wild forest. The ancient pockets of woods with names such as Puddler's Wood and Pismire which have stood here since 1600 are protected.

I went to visit the area and found the open areas of land to be a magnificent riot of colours with wildflowers in abundance, such as yellow rattle, oxeyed daisy and field scabious. Over 200 species of flowers have been recorded including pyramidal, spotted and south marsh orchids which have set themselves. Butterflies were on the wing. Sky larks rose and sang their hearts out above me. Blackcaps' rich voices call from the hedgerows. I spent my time meandering around the paths through meadows and woodlands. There is also an arboretum with all our true native trees, and information about how we previously used them. It's a fabulous place to freely visit at any time of the year. It shows so well how we can transform landscapes to a rich and fertile place of interest.

These are monthly, shorter, childfriendly, interactive communion services with songs and prayers which are held once a month: usually but not always on the second Sunday of the month. Children stay in church for the whole of the service.







FOLK AT ST ANDREW'S

Band play tribute to Chris Seward

Forbes Mutch reviews a standout show by folk rockers Gryphon



Andy Findon played a haunting rendition of *The Lark Ascending* as a tribute to Chris.

During the 1970s, when I was a teenager at school, I would go with a friend from our homes in Nottingham to see bands playing at the famous De Montford Hall in Leicester. One night we went saw the progressive rock band Yes. It was a memorable gig but, for me, what made it special was the first half support by an interesting folk-rock band called Gryphon, playing a unique blend of traditional English folk music, progressive rock and Renaissance instrumentation. Their music was outstanding for its use of historical and unusual instruments such as crumhorns, bassoons and recorders, which created a sound that bridged centuries and styles.

Fast forward 50 years and Gryphon come to play at St Andrew's, and nothing about their music has changed. The six-piece ensemble still display virtuosity, whimsical arrangements and а commitment to musical craftsmanship. Alright, three original only members appear at St Andrew's, but the sound



is the same. The shaggy Brian Gulland, looking like a white-haired Jerry Garcia of the Grateful Dead, still plays bassoon and crumhorn and provides vocals, Dave Oberlé plays drums and percussion, while guitarist Graeme Taylor solidifies the classic Gryphon sound of traditional English folk tunes played with period instruments, but incorporating elements of rock, jazz and symphonic music. In the early days the band's publicist, Martin Lewis described the band by Henry VIII saving: Imagine in а rock'n'roll band and think Gryphon. It's a neat description that applied then and remains accurate today.



The lineup at St Andrew's featured Gulland, Oberlé and Taylor, with Clare

Taylor on keyboards and violin, Andy Findon on woodwinds and Rob Levy on bass guitar.

As it was in the 1970s, the Gryphon live performance on the altar stage was an immersive experience that transported the near-capacity audience through centuries of sound. The concert was as much a display of musical precision as a celebration of quirky, theatrical energy.

Band play tribute to Chris Seward

The band members frequently swapped instruments between songs, and their stage presence balanced light-hearted humour with reverent musical skill.

Their setlist featured a mix of material from across their discography, including reimagined folk songs and complex progressive compositions. Highlights

included their opening number Kemp's Jiq, a lively traditional dance tune performed with gusto on crumhorns and recorders, its driving rhythm and sprightly melody getting the concert off to a lively start. Other standout songs were Normal Wisdom from the Swamp, written partly as an homage to Dr John, which showcased the genre-blending texture that defines the band,

and the humoursly-named *Sailor V* (c'est la vie, geddit?) which blended seafaring themes with rock-driven momentum and classical counterpoint.

For the audience at St Andrew's, the most poignant moment came just before the interval, when the classically-trained Andy Findon played a haunting rendition of *The Lark Ascending*, that short,

single-movement work by English composer Ralph Vaughan Williams. He played it as a tribute to our friend, the late Chris Seward, and it stunned those present with its simplicity, bringing many in the audience to tears. Earlier, the band had agreed to perform the gig in memory of Chris, who manager Michael Barnes described as a `kind and


lovely man'.

Gryphon's concert will remain in the memory of many as a rare and cherished event that combined musicianship with theatrical flair and emotion. Rest assured, the successful programme of folk concerts that Chris launched will continue, partly in memory of its founder, but also as an important part of the church's outreach to the community.

Bands and artists enjoy the warm welcome that they receive at St Andrew's; they love the acoustics and enjoy the enthusiasm of the audiences. Thank you for your support. An informal team of church members has been formed to continue the work of Chris. As I was able to tell him in hospital before he died: Chris, it's taking a committee of six to replace your organisational skills! Thank you, Chris, for what you started. Your grace, knowledge and gentle charm will be missed, not only by the community of St Andrew's and Hertford but by a growing number of artists and musicians on the UK folk circuit.
