FLAGS

During the 'Marching Season', back in my homeland of Northern Ireland, Protestant towns and villages hang British flags from lampposts and bedroom windows, and paint the



curbs red, white and blue. Ask the locals what they think this is about, and I imagine you will get different answers. To some, it is an act of patriotism, a declaration of our Britishness and a commemoration of the Battle of the Boyne. Ask others and they might say that it's a marking of territory by a community that feels under siege; a defiant declaration of 'This land is ours'.

When we see the flags that have recently appeared on lampposts and graffitied on roundabouts, what message do we think is being promoted?

To some, this is a patriotic act, a declaration of national pride. To others, it is an aggressive marking of territory, fueled by a politic of hate and fear of the 'other'.

In the right context, a flag can be a unifying thing; a symbol of our togetherness and the values that our country holds dear. I have questions however as to why these flags have sprung up at this particular time, when certain groups are targeting hotels and spreading hate-speak about immigrants and refugees.

Sometimes these groups seek to champion the fact that this is a 'Christian' nation. But perhaps they are unaware that Christ himself was a Middle Eastern refugee. Perhaps they have failed to understand that this is a nation of people who arrived in small boats, from the

The church is open during daylight hours, and there is a prayer space by the main door where there is an opportunity to post prayers on the prayer board and light a candle.

Saxons to the Celts; the Romans, the Normans; Scandinavians. Perhaps they have not realised that the St George of our flag was of Cappadocian (modern-day Turkey) descent. Certainly, they have failed to see that the cross is symbol of God's love for the whole world.

There is no question that certain parts of our community feel disenfranchised and threatened. There is no question that illegal immigration is a concern and needs tackling. There is a question however over the weaponisation of immigration and the use of our flag to intimidate.

Britain has always been a hospitable nation that has championed the refugee and been built on and bettered by subsequent waves of immigration. This is an incredible reason for national pride. So, may we take back our flag and pray

'Make us a channel of Your peace, Lord. Where there is hatred, let us bring Your love; where there's despair in life, let us bring hope'. Amen

This year the Bishops' Harvest Appeal is being run in partnership with Mission Direct who are working towards increasing access to education for some of the world's most under-resourced communities. 
WELWYN GARDEN CITY MALE VOICE CHOIR


the story behind the need for an air-source heat pump

Some may be aware that the boiler in the Centre has seen better days and needs replacing. The Church of England, as part of its mission, requires us all to think about reducing our carbon footprint. So, when an opportunity to implement measures to do just that emerges, we need to act, which is exactly what the PCC Eco-Committee, the PCC, and the Centre's Trustees are aiming to do.

But it takes understanding, planning, time and a budget!

The science behind an air source heat pump (the understanding bit): In very simple terms air-source heat pumps are designed to move heat from one place to another. They capture heat from the air, which is then passed through a heat exchanger, then a compressor to increase the pressure and by doing so create a higher temperature. The air is then passed through another heat exchanger where energy (ie heat) is transferred to the water that flows into the radiators and hot water cylinders. Magic!. And at this point I wish I had paid more attention to my physics lessons at school, but I remember enough to think how clever is that!

Planning: Like all good things that happen in a church, we need consent for the Diocese – It's called a faculty and requires, in this case, the eminently efficient and organised Shirley Taylor finding out all sorts of things she never dreamed she needed to know (building heat efficiency, Energy Performance Certificates, etc etc). And of course there is need for planning permission from the council. Over to Andrew Goodman on that one, once the PCC has given the green light. Both the faculty and the planning application require detailed architectural drawings

comparable quotes, noise and insulation calculations (also one for Andrew)!

The budget and fund raising: Alongside the air-source heat pump we need some additional insulation – we don't want our newly found air sourced heat flying straight out the windows or walls (especially in the John Summers Gill room). All of this comes at a price which we think is worth it, but it needs funding. So far we have:

- £4,000 committed from the Town Council – Thank you Town Council and thank you Laura Ramsey for a great application so that Jenny just needed to talk for three minutes at a Town council meeting to secure the funds.
- Our coffee morning on the 4th
 October we have high hopes come along.
- £7,500 from a government grant.

But we still need a few thousand pounds more before we start the work with the aim of replacing the boiler so, we are actively pursuing additional funding options – if anyone has any ideas please let us know especially for insulation.

It all takes time and a lot of input from people, but we are sure it will be worth it. It will help to reduce our carbon footprint, should be more efficient than a standard

combustion heating system unless we are unlucky enough to experience temperatures outside of -20°c or less (I hope not!) plus the other good news is that it should need less maintenance than a more traditional solution. What's not to like!

CHILDREN AT ST ANDREW'S

Children are never too young to come to church. You and your children are very welcome at St Andrew's. We realise that bringing children, especially babies and toddlers, to church can be challenging to say the least, so we have set aside part of the church (the Children's Corner) at the front of church (to the right of the altar) which is equipped with toys, books, craft materials and a space to call their own. Here, even if they are occupied with a toy or book, children absorb the atmosphere of worship.

ARE YOUR LOCKS BEHAVING BADLY?

FOLK AT ST ANDREW'S...still a folk music hot spot

The autumn season of folk music at St Andrew's was kicked off with two special but contrasting concerts, proving that the altar stage at the church is still a hot spot for live performances. **Forbes Mutch reports**.

Gigspanner Big Band

When Gigspanner Big Band had their concert at a local theatre in Hertford cancelled at short notice it was not surprising that the band contacted St Andrew's immediately. Ι say surprising because the gig was part of a UK tour to promote the band's 2025 live album Turnstone, over 90 per cent of which was recorded at St Andrew's in November 2024. It seemed natural that one of the most popular live folk bands in the UK should return full circle to the scene of a previous triumph, where the intimate and resonant acoustics are suited to their blend of folk tradition and inventive arrangement beautifully on two previous occasions.

From the first few bars of the evening, it was clear that this latest outing would be more than a standard folk concert. The line-up – Peter Knight on fiddle and vocals, Hannah Martin (violin, vocals), Phillip Henry (dobro, harmonica), John Spiers (melodeon and concertina), Roger Flack (guitar) and Sacha Trochet (percussion) – delivered the intricate textures that define the Big Band. Their years of collaboration showed: all six played with an ease that allowed the music room to both breathe and swell.

Much of the material was drawn, fittingly, from the *Turnstone* album, a record praised for its balancing act between precision and spontaneity. The summer evening light in the church accentuated the dynamics: soft passages – Knight's fiddle, Spiers' melodeon –floated into silence, only to be swelled by dobro, guitar, percussion



and full harmonies. Traditional ballads like *Suffolk Miracle* and *Hind Horn* felt both timeless and renewed.

Vocals were a highlight: Hannah Martin's voice brought clarity and emotional edge, Knight's voice more reserved but expressive, and Henry's harmonies adding depth at just the right moments.

The mix was handled well for the venue: even with the natural reverb of stone walls, each voice could be heard. Instrumental solos were threaded through the performance, moments of shimmering fiddle, resonant melodeon flourishes, and guitar/percussion pairings underpinning rhythmic shifts.

The set pacing was thoughtful. Midconcert, there were slower, more haunting pieces, but these were counterbalanced by livelier reels or tunesets towards the end. The finish was especially strong: a medley of tunes that built up, layers of instrumentation combining, all musicians visibly feeding off the energy. The ending left the audience both satisfied and grateful for the journey.


For folk lovers, for those who appreciate innovation and for anyone drawn to the intersection of tradition and artistic

boldness, Gigspanner Big Band at St Andrew's was an evening of real richness. And I finally learned what a 'gigspanner' is – it's a cast iron traditional bottle opener, which is now part of the band's merchandise. I was pleased to take one home as a reminder of another fabulous concert at St Andrew's.

Phil Beer

In June 2019, one of the first folk concerts at St Andrew's featured Steve Knightly, one half of the celebrated folk duo Show of Hands. Phil Beer is the other half of that act, so it seemed only fair to give him the opportunity to play a solo gig at the church.



From the moment he walked onto the stage, guitar in hand and a wry smile under the lights, the tone was set for a night of warmth and connection. He opened with a rousing instrumental, reminding us of his technical wizardry before settling into a mix of traditional ballads, reimagined covers and his own material. The sound was full, almost improbably so, for a solo act. The musician's command of fiddle, mandolin, slide guitar, and six-string gave each number its own texture and colour.

What really stood out, though, was the balance between virtuosity and storytelling. Phil is a natural raconteur, peppering his set with anecdotes from life on the road, collaborations with other folk legends, and tales behind the songs.

The setlist was as eclectic as one might expect from a musician whose career spans decades. Traditional English folk sat comfortably alongside American

> roots tunes, and Phil's of interpretations other artists' material drew as much applause as his spirited take old sea shanties. shifted easily between styles, all the while maintaining an unmistakable personal stamp. song felt lived-in, authentic and generous

never showy, always inviting.

The audience rapport was a highlight. Phil Beer has the rare knack of making a crowd feel like friends. His self-deprecating humour, sly asides, and relaxed stage presence meant that the evening flowed effortlessly. At times, it felt less like a concert and more like being welcomed into a fireside gathering of stories and songs in someone's home.

By the time he reached his encore, which he introduced by quoting famous 1960s television performer Jake Thackery – 'that was the last one, now here's another' – a soaring fiddle-led number that had the audience clapping in unison, it was clear why Phil Beer continues to command such affection. His gigs are not grand spectacles; they are reminders of the power of live music in its purest form – unplugged, honest and rooted in tradition. He will be welcomed back at any time.



LOVE THY NEIGHBOUR: WHO IS MY NEIGHBOUR?

REV BILL CHURCH TAKES A FRESH LOOK AT THE PARABLE OF THE GOOD SAMARITAN AND WHAT WE CAN TAKE FROM IT

There is a debate, triggered by the American Vice President J D Vance, about whether Christian ethics require or allow that the second commandment -Love thy neighbour - has a hierarchy of nearness. That is to say, are you expected to love those closest to you, your family; then your neighbours; then your local congregation or community; then your own country; and only then those in other countries? This all started in the context of slashing the United States' overseas aid budget, and as a rationale for stopping overseas aid until all the needs of the domestic United States could be met. This was not a good starting point, but there is a debate to be had. First of all, it is certainly true in a negative sense - if you don't love those near you, how can you truly love those far off? St John, in his First Epistle, writes: "If a man says, 'I love God', while hating his brother, he is a liar. If he does not love the brother whom he has seen, it cannot be that he loves God whom he has not seen." Dickens in Bleak House, more amusingly illustrates that point when he portrays Mrs Jellyby as a diligent collector of funds for the distantly and vaguely located people of Borriobola while completely neglecting her own children. But for the main issue, the Parable of the Good Samaritan speaks loudly. It was provoked by the question from a teacher of the law of Moses: "Who is my neighbour?". Luke assumes the question was insincere, put just to test Jesus But, anyway, it is a reasonable question to ask. And the parable itself only answers the question back to front. At the end, Jesus asks the lawyer: Who did the right thing? Who had followed God's rule for his people,

given to Moses in Leviticus, "You shall love your neighbour as yourself"? The lawyer had to give the obvious answer that it was the Samaritan who did the right thing, not the Priest or the Levite who passed by on the other side. This must have been painful for him, because it meant agreeing that the one who best followed the Law of Moses was the one whom he and most of Jesus' hearers would have classed as outside the Law. If you want to know from the parable who is the neighbour that you are expected to love, then you have to work it out for yourself. The injured traveller was not in the Samaritan's family, nor from his street or village, nor even from his own faith or nationality. But he was someone in need whom the Samaritan was in a position to help, being there and equipped with first aid and ambulance donkey and enough cash to pay the innkeeper. From this I deduce that your neighbour is: someone in need, whom you can help and who is willing to be helped (we have to assume this about the injured traveller), and for whom your help will be effective, not just a sop to your conscience (which was surely the case on the Jericho Road). If there is someone in need whom you cannot help, for whatever reason, then love can be shown by prayer. But the Epistle of James mocks those who could help but just pray instead. In the second great commandment, your neighbour is someone who needs help, whom you can help, who is willing to be helped and for whom your help will be effective. Faced with that, as Jesus said: "Go and do thou likewise".
