Last Sunday after Trinity

Readings: Leviticus 19: 1-2; 15-18 and Matthew 22: 34-40

In a blog entitled <u>'The Second Wave Breaks'</u>, Paul Valler¹ reflected last week that:

"As the days get darker and shorter, people are finding the prospect of more restrictions for months to come even harder than when we first went into lockdown.

In the first pandemic wave many experienced loss in all sorts of ways. Now, after an emotionally draining six months, the second wave is here. Apart from the medical impact, we have more job losses, more uncertainty, a very real lack of fun, and the disappointing reality that this is going to go on for a long time. We are running out of steam. As Psalm 42 says, 'all your waves and breakers have swept over us.' We need hope."

We participate in this economy when we continue to strip the dignity from any sort of bodily - or embodied - work and exploit mainly Black and brown bodies for hard labour with criminally low wages and working conditions in exchange for comfort enjoyed only by some.

We all fall prey to the logic of extraction when we engage mindlessly in consumerism and accumulation, whether through buying stuff we do not need or wasting what we have."

Lord, may we share in your longing and working toward wholeness and healing, toward justice and restoration for all created beings. Help us to participate in building a more radical and sacred economy - one where each person and every created being is indispensable and worthy of care.

Thank you, Lord, that once again this week a 22-year-old footballer³ has demonstrated more wisdom and compassion than the Government and its MPs, with a few notable exceptions, can muster. and Northern Ireland to acknowledge and respond to the fact that children and families who need support with food in term time do also need to eat during holiday periods.

May those MPs who enjoy a basic salary of £82,000 and public subsidised food allowances in certain circumstances withdraw their objection to ensuring that children have enough to eat, and learn that they have a responsibility to care about child health.

As our Government this week imposed a legal requirement on schools to facilitate remote learning, may they make available and fairly distribute the additional resources required to do this, including the provision of laptop computers and broadband connection where necessary.

Lord, it has been an incredibly difficult year for the people of Lebanon: an economic crisis, protests across the country, coronavirus and then the catastrophic explosion which destroyed much of the central part of Beirut. This is on top of other healthcare stresses, including supporting a refugee population of 1.7 million.

 The Tahaddi Centre, a Tearfund partner, supports families with food and education. Help them to continue this support when constrained by lockdown restrictions. May the transition from face-to-face to online learning evolve smoothly.

- International Health Partners (IHP) has brought together two organisations in order to help people access much-needed medicines - antibiotics, treatments for parasitic worms, and medicines for diabetes and heart disease:
 - Anera runs health and other services in many of the country's Palestinian and Syrian refugee camps.
 - International Medical Corps (IMC) supports a network of healthcare clinics and dispensaries and operates mobile medical units and emergency response.

Bless the work of all three organisations as they put together a shipment for refugee camps in Jordan.

Footage posted after the events and broadcast live on social media showed soldiers firing live rounds into fleeing protesters.
